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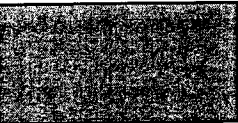

### No conflict with UN posting: Martin

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United Nations — Paul Martin sees no conflict with heading up a United Nations commission while running for the job of Canada's prime minister.

Mr. Martin has been named as co-chairman of a UN commission that is designed to boost the private-sector economies of developing countries.

The appointment was made official Friday in New York.

Mr. Martin says he wants Canada to play a greater role on the world stage.

And he says taking on the UN job while running to lead the federal Liberal party is no different than a cabinet minister running for the same job.

Heritage Minister Sheila Copps — Mr. Martin's only remaining opponent for the leadership — has retained her cabinet post while running to become party leader.

The Liberals will choose a successor to Jean Chrétien at a Toronto convention in November, although Mr. Martin is widely expected to win.

Mr. Chrétien has said he won't step down until February 2004 — after the UN

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Mr. Stronach has said he won't step down until February 2004 after the CRTC commission is expected to have completed its work.

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
