## BACKGROUND AND PROJECT DETAILS

Illegal, Unreported and Unregulated (IUU) fishing and maritime activities are among threats to Tanzania’s fish stocks and have major implications in terms of food security, livelihoods and employment, environment, and economy. Henceforth, UNDP has been collaborating with the government of Tanzania and Japanese Government to establish and strengthen an overarching and comprehensive coordinating mechanism for overseeing the national maritime safety and security activities. The coordination mechanism is envisioned to urgently enhance the government’s response to increasingly unpredictable IUU fishing, maritime pollution, smuggling and illicit trafficking.



## EXPECTED RESULTS

- Establishing a statutory national framework for maritime coordination.
- Improved capacity in tackling and coordinating Maritime Safety and Security issues.
- Reduced post-harvest losses by increasing the use of post harvesting fish processing technologies - fish drying racks.
