

This project took a holistic approach towards addressing the issue of women's social and economic vulnerability, including the stigma associated with being **survivors** of gender-based violence.

After analyzing market and value chain based employment opportunities, UNDP provided vulnerable women with training, information, and financial support for **employment and business creation**.

The project developed linkages with formal employment sectors, financial institutions, and community-based **organisations**.



"I wasn't doing well at all because my husband is too ill to work. Now I'm the one supporting the family. My brother died of Cholera and his children live with me now. Thanks to the money I earn selling chickens, I can send the kids to school. The organization helps us move forward. Especially me, so, so much."
