Community members in rural areas get employment opportunities to improve their livelihood skills through Cash-for-Work.





46 NEW CONSTRUCTION/REHABILITATION

- The project engineers developed detailed engineering designs and Bill of Quantity for 46 infrastructures mainstreaming PwD accessibilities, environmental sustainability, climate resilience, and gender equality.
- Environmental & social impact assessment and feasibility studies have been conducted at 46 sites by a third-party international contractor.
- All 46 constructions have been certified by ANLA National Environmental License.
- The construction plan was consulted and consented by PDIM/PMDS, local authorities and community members.



233 LOCAL LEADERS TRAINED FOR CASH-FOR-WORK (CFW)




- Developed 3 technical guidelines on the process of community infrastructures that outlines SOP-CFW, Environmental and Social Monitoring Plan (ESMP), Health, Security, and environment (HSE).

ESTABLISHMENT OF CFW SCHEMES

- Established Technical Cooperation Committee (TCC) at Municipal levels.
- Set up Grievance Redress Mechanism (GRM) at Suco Office.
- Increased awareness of Protection from Sexual Exploitation, Abuse, and Harassment (PSEAH).

Beneficiary Assessment

- Age : Averaged 38.84 years old
- Family Size: Averaged 4.65 people/per household
- Individual Income: Averaged US\$ 0-50/ per month
- Occupation: Mostly agricultural-related job

- Bobonaro: 200 participants (47% Female) at 2 sites
- Ermera: 200 participants (51% Female) at 2 sites
- Liquica: 391 participants (50% Female) at 4 sites
- Oe-cusse: 464 participants (53% Female) at 5 sites
