

Youth as an Initiator



Linkage between CPD & Youth Strategy 2.0



The UNDP Executive Board approved in February 2022 a new 5-year Country Programme for Thailand for the period 2022-2026.

The new Country Programme is fully aligned with the United Nations Sustainable **Development Cooperation Framework** signed between UN Thailand and the Government of Thailand for the same period and to the National Economic and Social Development Plan. alignment of UNDP Thailand Youth Strategy and the Country Programme Document (CPD) for Thailand.

The objectives of the new programme are to:: (a) accelerate Thailand's transformation into an inclusive economy based on green, resilient, low-carbon, sustainable development; (b) create the human capital needed for social and inclusive development; and (c) increase the ability of people living in Thailand, especially vulnerable people, to participate in and benefit from development, free from discrimination.

It is structured around 3 outcomes and 6 outputs. The Youth Engagement Strategy is fully aligned to support the achievement of the Programme.

CPD

Outcome 1:

Thailand's transformation into an inclusive economy based on green, resilient, low carbon, sustainable development is accelerated.



Outcome 2:

Human capital needed for social and inclusive development is improved through the strengthening of institutions, partnerships, and the empowerment of people



Outcome 3:

People living in Thailand, especially those at risk of being left furthest behind, are able to participate in and benefit from development, free from all forms of discrimination.

Youth Civic Engagement

UNDP creates platforms to connect youth with government and other partners to ensure their voices are heard and support their contribution to development

The youth civic engagement approach promotes youth engagement with government agencies and stakeholders on policy development that is strengthened at national and sub-national levels to support the implementation of gender-responsive, inclusive climate actions and biodiversity conservation.

Output 1.1

Gender-responsive and inclusive solutions in national, subnational climate actions and biodiversity conservation are strengthened for increased resilience

The youth civic engagement approach provides meaningful youth participation in policy-decision making through building an intergenerational platform for raising youth-related issues and topics submitted to national and sub-national authorities to foster human rights and equality, especially to satisfy the needs of vulnerable youth.
