BUILDING A BETTER FUTURE

We are glad to share highlights of UNDP and its partner's work in 2022 to accompany Libya to become more united, democratic and prosperous. Despite the lack of progress towards a political agreement and the organization of elections to renew institutions, establish legitimate authorities which can develop a national development plan with a national budget, UNDP continued to adjust its programming to alleviate the burden of division, instability and the fragile security situation at a national level and in communities in the East, West and South. While working with authorities at policy and central levels, UNDP continued placing people, their rights and needs at the centre of efforts to achieve peace and prosperity at a local level.

The report also features UNDP's efforts to build stronger foundations for development throughout 2022. These efforts meet the needs of the present generation without compromising the ability of future generations to meet their own needs, balancing economic growth, social progress, and environmental protection.

This has been done through continuous support to municipalities in peacebuilding efforts and promoting economic recovery, while also investing in democratic governance and strengthening institutions. Additionally, UNDP's work with Libyan authorities to transition to a more sustainable energy system is crucial for balancing economic growth and environmental protection.

This year we also launched our new Country Programme contributing directly to the United Nations Development Cooperation Framework for 2023-2025 based on extensive consultations around Libya as well as reviews on what worked best in the previous cycle and what we could do better. The new programme reinforces the efficiency and effectiveness of UNDP's commitment to building peace and strengthening governance and adds a new programme on climate change adaptation and energy transition to promote sustainable growth in Libya. The new programme strengthens UNDP's engagement at the local level in the most vulnerable municipalities, notably in the South. It also seeks to deepen partnership with those institutions which can foster positive change despite the political context. It finally sets ambitious goals to bring together a wider array of resources, notably counting on greater contributions from the Libyan government.

In addition, UNDP launched a significant recruitment campaign to build a strong corps of national colleagues to deliver on the new programme. We are glad that 40% of the new recruits are women. We are also thrilled to have moved into our new Country Office in Tripoli which will allow the full operation of the Country Office in Tripoli for the first time in seven years and enable growth and closer partnerships.

We are grateful to our partners for their continued trust and the support of local communities. We look forward to the upcoming year as we launch new initiatives in rule of law, local governance, energy transition and climate change adaptation, while deepening our engagement on local peacebuilding in the East and South.

LOCAL PEACEBUILDING

A decade of political crisis, conflict and division has heavily affected Libya and its progress towards the 2030 Agenda. The unprecedented impact of conflict illustrates the critical importance of consistent investment in sustaining peace through prioritizing development and peacebuilding at a local level.

According to UNDP's Global Human Development Report 2021/2022, launched in Tripoli in November 2022, the last decade of conflict and instability has eliminated 20 years of progress in human development. The loss has not been suffered equally across municipalities. The ongoing lack of political consensus and the lack of a national budget means development funding has been limited, and the work to build peace at a local level in the most vulnerable municipalities is even more critical.

Counting on over 50 years in Libya and in close cooperation with authorities and local communities, UNDP supports inclusive approaches and established an area-based Local Peacebuilding and Resilience Programme to mark the transition from immediate stabilization towards longer-term development and peacebuilding. This transformation has been vital in ensuring that the gains made in the short term are sustainable over the long term. By strengthening the capacity of communities to cope with shocks and stresses, UNDP can help to reduce the risk of conflict and instability in the future and promote investment in the outcome.

Throughout 2022, UNDP assisted local authorities in restoring essential services and infrastructure to promote economic recovery in areas most vulnerable as a result of conflict, displacement, pressure from migration, or erosion of state legitimacy leading to limited services, job opportunities, conflict trafficking and smuggling.

Localizing knowledge and expertise is crucial to building long-term sustainability and ensuring that communities can continue accessing basic services. By laying the ground for strong local partnerships with municipal authorities, CSOs and other development partners, UNDP assists in building the capacities of these institutions and promotes equitable access to basic services for all, including vulnerable groups.

UNDP economic recovery work focuses on supporting Libyan partners to promote economic growth and job creation. The role youth play in promoting economic recovery and strengthening peacebuilding, contributing to employment and effective participation in local economic recovery. UNDP supported young women and men with vocational and business skills with professions that support reconstruction and promote an entrepreneurial culture. These initiatives will contribute to livelihood restoration and economic recovery for the improved well-being and resiliency of young Libyans.

UNDP, in partnership with the Ministry of Labour and Rehabilitation supported the Libyan Korean Centre establish 14 training departments, such as tailoring, sewing, health plumbing, car maintenance, and a computer lab that would provide support to young entrepreneurs' boost economic recovery, contributing to peaceful coexistence in the country.

Additionally, UNDP is working to establish a Career and Business Centre within the Libyan Korean Centre, from which selected graduates will receive grants to turn their ideas into successful businesses.



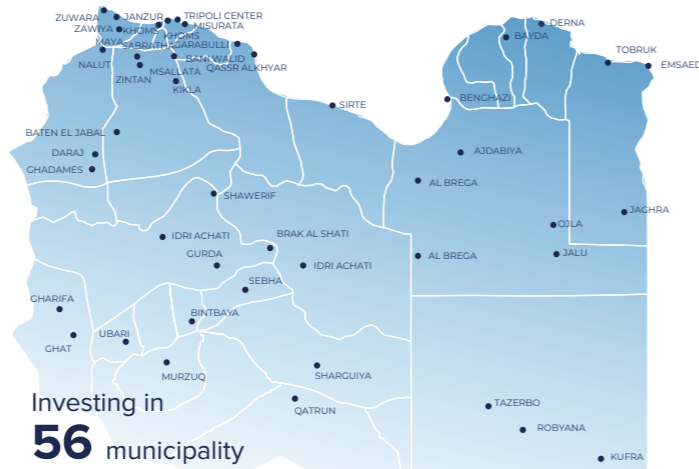

In **Tawergha**, **Kikla** and **Ubari**, a Cash for Work programme has been launched to create conditions that will provide temporary job opportunities to approximately 450 vulnerable people and encourage the return of displaced families. This contributed to social cohesion and the rehabilitation of schools, health facilities, public spaces and recreational spaces.

DEMOCRATIC GOVERNANCE

As institutional division and intermittent conflict have continued, diminishing citizens' trust in state institutions, UNDP maintained its critical investment in Libya's democratization process, good governance, transparency and building towards an inclusive social contract.



Highlighting the many routes towards effective and accountable governance, UNDP worked closely with national and local authorities and civil society institutions to tackle these emerging complexities in improving rule of law and justice in Libya.



UNDP also invested in more effective ways to ensure access to justice for those most in need by extensive consultations at community, municipality, and national level. This has been the foundation of the new Rule of Law and Justice project to start in March 2023. UNDP also invested in the relationship between the Ministry of Justice and Ministry of Interior to ensure the justice chain serves people and decreases the current culture of impunity. In the new initiative UNDP will build upon good experience in the Local Peacebuilding and Resilience Programme and for the first time work on localized solutions for justice, a people-centered approach and working at a municipal level on small-scale solutions to upgrade rule of law that will impact people on the ground.

UNDP has been involved in several initiatives aimed at improving the criminal justice system in Libya. Key deliverables include a one-week study tour to Italy for 12 members of the Libyan judicial police to learn about best practices in investigations and prison reform. While also developing and supporting a coordination mechanism through a joint programme to identify capacity-building and reform initiatives for criminal justice institutions. Additionally, UNDP has enhanced the capacity of law enforcement agencies to respond to and investigate Sexual and Gender-Based Violence (SGBV), improved prison infrastructure, and established media communications offices to enhance public outreach and awareness. The joint programme has also supported the establishment of a vocational training centre inside Al-Jadeida prison to provide livelihood opportunities for inmates, developed standard operating procedures (SOPs) for prisons, and developed specialized training curricula for police patrolling.



eMonitor+, a digital platform developed by UNDP's Regional Bureau of Arab States designed a platform that helps scan online media posts to identify, electoral violations, misinformation, hate speech, political polarization and pluralism, and online violence against women. Such data analysis enables election commissions and media stakeholders to observe the prevalence, nature and impact of online violence.

As 2022 was a non-election year, UNSMIL and UNDP continued to support the High National Election Commission (HNEC) to sustain its capacity and preparedness to conduct inclusive, credible and transparent elections. Including capacity development training focused on election-specific and general professional training of HNEC staff and expanding the Commission's regional and international networks, while also expanding the quantitative data and qualitative evidence that will inform the cultivation of a more inclusive electoral environment.

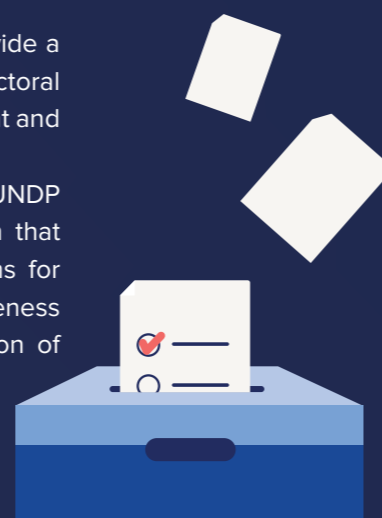

UNDP is working with the High National Election Commission (HNEC) to provide a safe environment for women and enhance their participation in the electoral process by gathering quantifiable data to understand the causes of harassment and violence against women and identify solutions.

In response to rising online hate speech, disinformation, and misinformation, UNDP and HNEC collaborate to combat this global issue of information pollution that affects social cohesion in Libya. The partnership includes training programs for identifying and reporting hate speech and disinformation and public awareness campaigns to encourage responsible media reporting and critical evaluation of information.

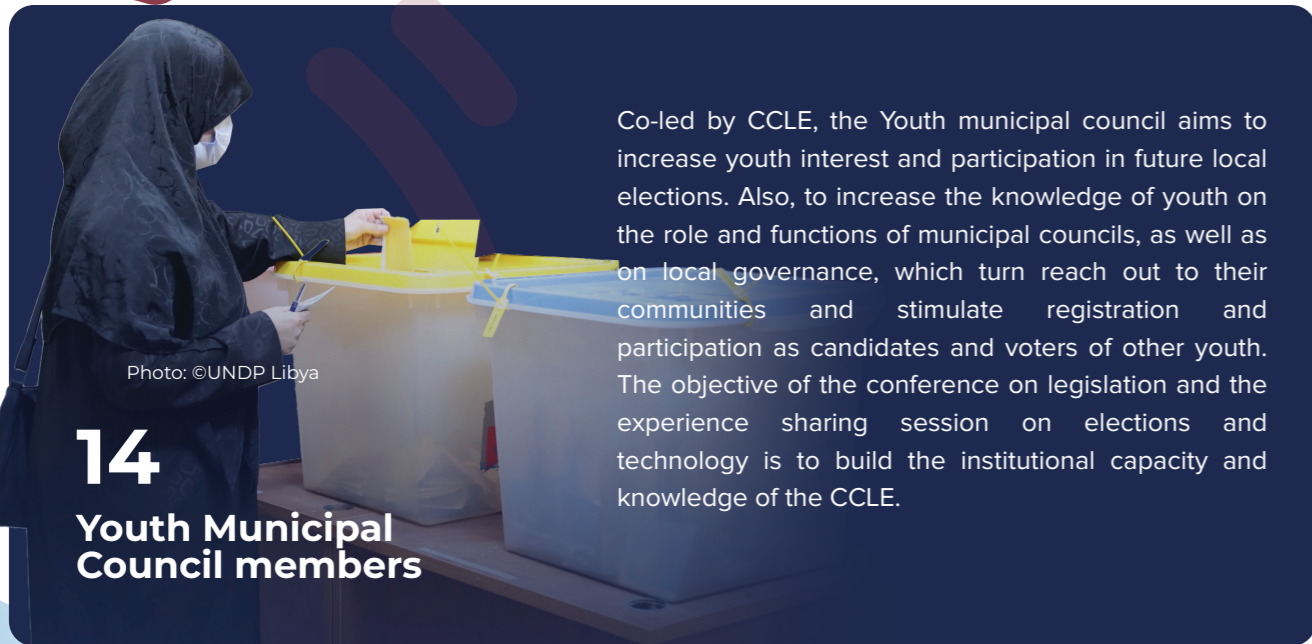

Underlining the importance of youth political participation, UNDP supported five young Libyans from different regions to travel and participate in a regional conference on “Youth Participation in Electoral Processes in the Arab Region” hosted by the Organization of Arab Electoral Management bodies in partnership with UNDP. During the conference, the young people launched the Arab Network for Youth in Elections.

In efforts to build reconciliation and reintegration, UNDP enhanced the role of a network of local mediators through virtual and in person capacity-building training on conflict analysis, conflict resolution, peace agreements writing, and gender mainstreaming.

UNDP promoted the institutionalization of reconciliation efforts through technical support to the Libyan Presidential Council in establishing the required legal and political framework and mechanisms to create the high commission of the national reconciliation in

GREENING LIBYA'S DEVELOPMENT

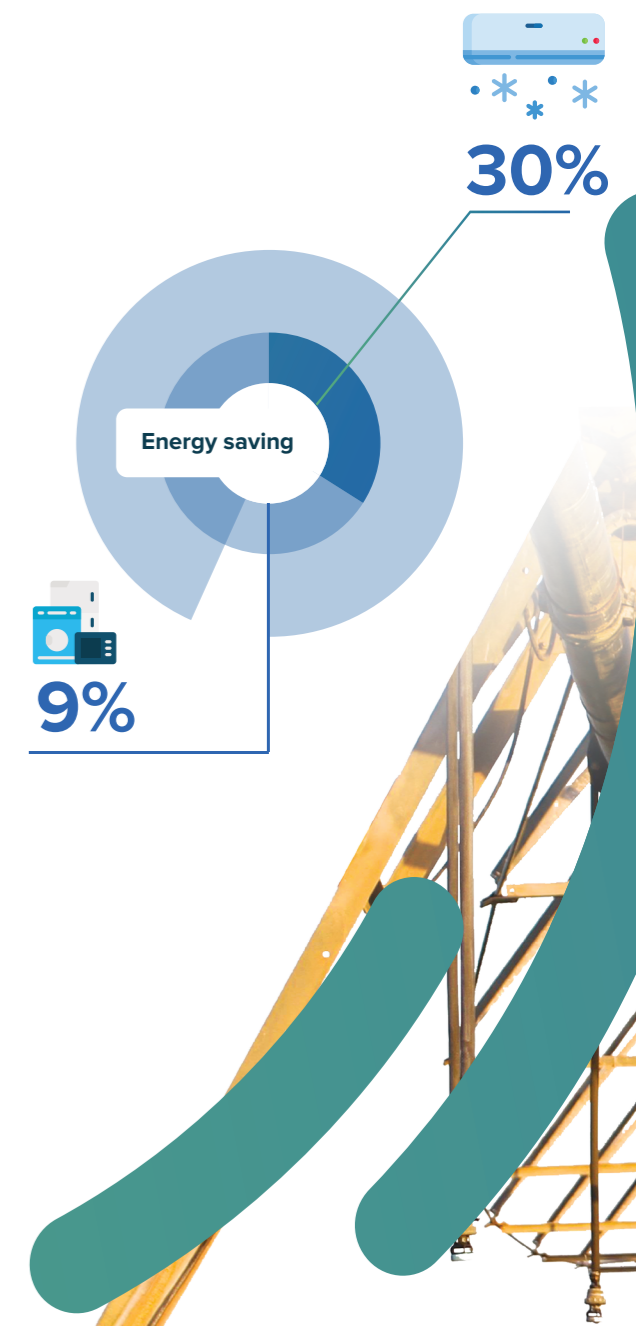
CLIMATE ACTION

As climate change impacts are experienced across the world, rapid transformation is necessary to uphold countries to their pledge towards the Paris Agreement goals to strengthen the global response to the threat of climate change. As its effects are becoming more apparent, including rising temperatures and sea levels as well as more extreme weather events, the demand for action, especially among youth, is increasing. In Libya, climate change has led to heat waves and is expected to further degrade vital services, such as electricity and water.

UNDP has consistently worked on tackling the effects of climate change in the region and has focused its efforts in 2022 on developing its new programmes in Libya as a key pillar of its new Country Programme Document 2023-2025.

A shift is necessary for climate protection and the survival of future generations. The energy transition needs to ensure a balance between environmental, social and economic progress. UNDP worked with the National Economic and Social Development Board on leading the Energy Efficiency Committee on the development of the Minimum Energy Performance Standards. Applying these standards for air conditioners can save up to 30% of energy consumption, while for household electrical appliances, it can save 9% of total energy consumed in 2035.

As part of the work in 2022, UNDP is developing a new strategy aimed at providing an integrated response to environmental challenges, identifying mutually beneficial responses that are based on understanding the synergies of water, energy and climate change. The strategy is focused on three main areas:



UNDP works with the authorities to support the transition to a more sustainable energy system. This includes policy and regulatory reform to create the conditions for energy efficiency and investment in renewable energy and promoting the use of renewable energy sources like solar power, as well as improving energy efficiency across all economic sectors. To improve water security UNDP promotes sustainable water management practices, the protection of water resources, and the development of water infrastructure. UNDP will support the Ministry of Water Resources on policy and national strategy implementation and the Man-Made River Authority by improving pipeline performance and lifespan extension, and solar energy and energy storage for key asset autonomy.

PARTNERING FOR CLIMATE ACTION AND GREEN DEVELOPMENT IN LIBYA

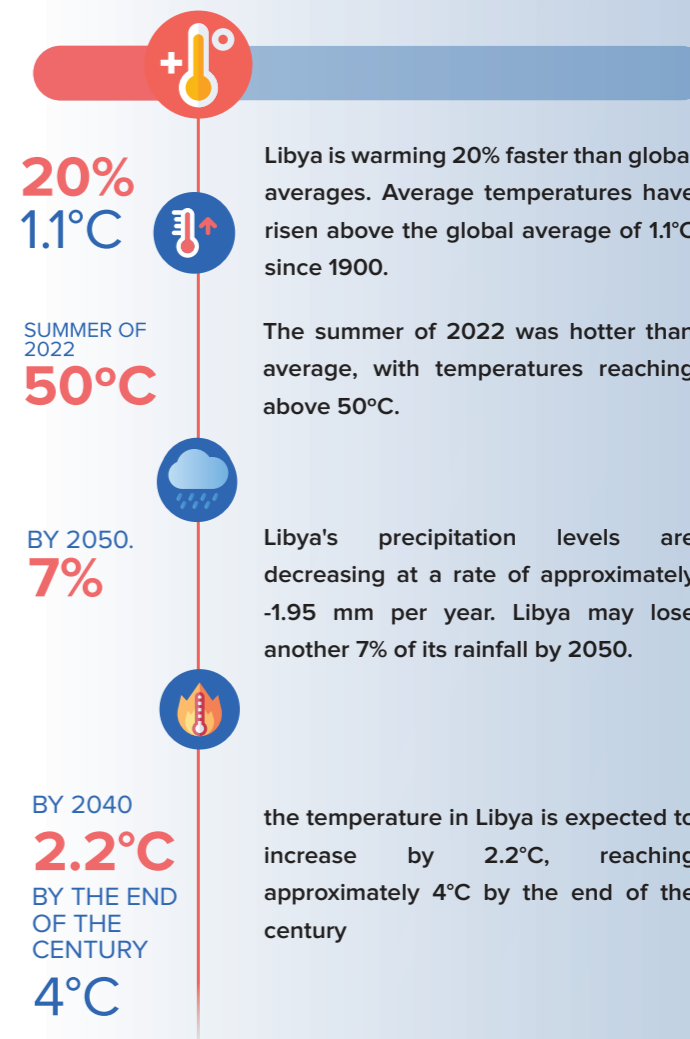
UNDP is a key partner in global efforts to address climate change and protect the environment. In Libya, UNDP is partnering with the Climate Change High Committee in Libya to develop the country's first National Determined Contribution (NDC). This plan will outline the country's commitment to reducing greenhouse gas emissions and adapting to the impacts of climate change aligned with its development priorities. While also working on building the capacities of national and local institutions in Libya to adapt to the impacts of climate change. By building resilience to climate impacts, UNDP aims to help Libyan communities become more sustainable and self-sufficient.



UNDP is partnering with the **National Oil Corporation (NOC)** and its **International Oil Company (IOC)** partners in Libya to reduce emissions of methane and other greenhouse gases from the oil and gas sector. This includes supporting efforts to reduce the amount of natural gas that is wasted during oil production, which can instead be used for domestic purposes or exported.

UNDP aims to establish an inclusive green economy, reduce emissions and promote renewable energy to build forward better. A large part of this effort is focused on sustainability and the development of the National Sustainable Energy Strategy until 2035 through analysis and evaluation of the development approach expected for the energy systems, a part of the overall development process, particularly ensuring access to affordable, reliable, sustainable and modern energy for all and Libya's climate pledge under the Paris Agreement.

CLIMATE NUMBERS



Libya has the highest greenhouse gas emissions per capita in Africa, at approximately 8.5 tons of carbon per person per year. The vast majority of greenhouse gas emissions come from electricity production and the oil sector.

Libya ranks as the eighth largest flaring country in the world, with around 4.7 billion cubic meters (BCM) flared in 2018. Libya's flare intensity per unit of oil produced is estimated at 12.8 m3/barrel. Fugitive gas emissions from leaks and irregular releases account for a substantial proportion of total emissions, especially in situations of inadequate routine maintenance.

WOMEN'S EMPOWERMENT

While women constitute half of Libya's population, they represent the largest marginalized population, UNDP is at the frontline supporting women's empowerment in the country, through targeted, gender-focused activities and by working to ensure that development efforts consider the needs of experience of women to yield better outcomes for their communities. As empowering women to take a more active role in their communities can improve outcomes for society as well as marginalized groups.

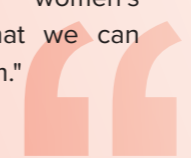

Through comprehensive trainings and small grants, CSOs engaged more than 1800 citizens - including 780 youth and 782 internally displaced persons - in activities like filmmaking, awareness campaigns, and peacebuilding workshops. The programme is part of UNDP's local peacebuilding and resilience efforts, in partnership with the Ministry of Local Government and with funding from the EU, aiming to foster trust in government and among communities by giving citizens a platform to advocate for change and a voice to the most vulnerable. By doing this, UNDP is also addressing the challenges of Libyan CSOs face related to organizational capacities, information-sharing, and access to technical and financial resources. One example is Women Forum for Development, which is empowering youth and women in Zawia, Sabratha, Zuwara, and Zultun as key pillars to build peace and provide economic opportunities for those who are most in need.

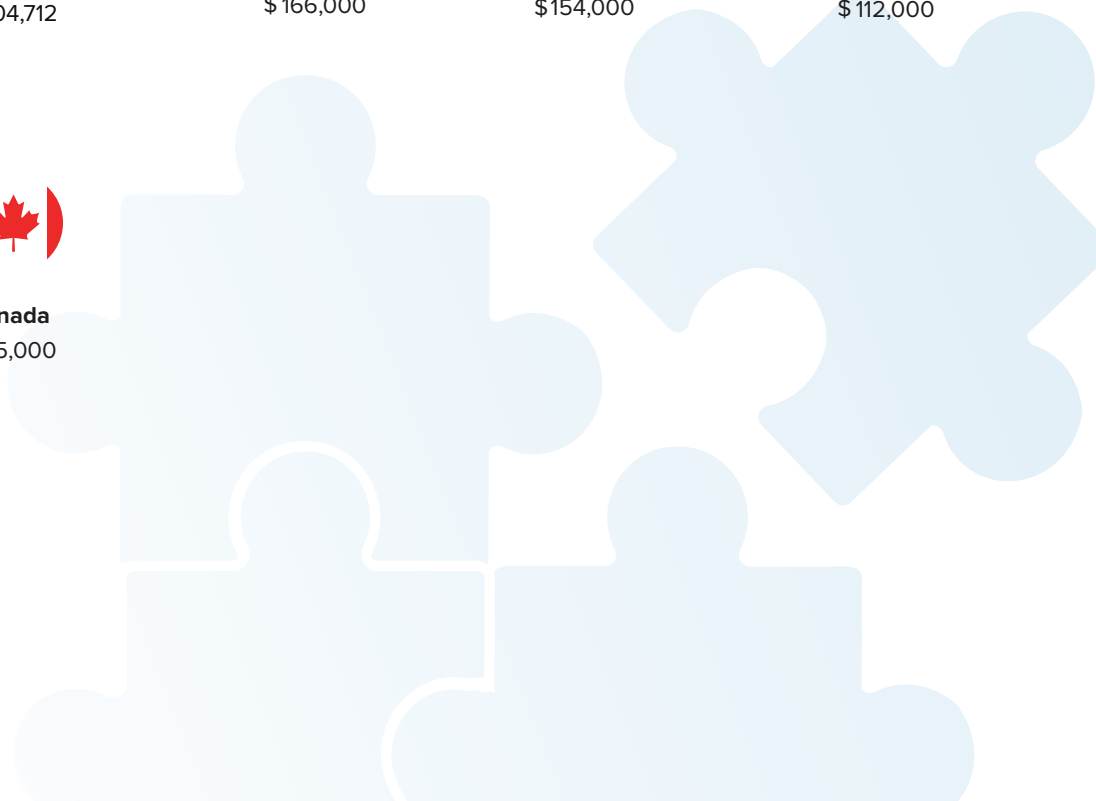
