## **Background**

Often cited as one of the world's most climate-vulnerable countries, Bangladesh's unique physiographic location, flat deltaic topography, and socio-economic infrastructure make it particularly vulnerable to extreme climate variability and climate change-induced disasters, including storm surges, floods, cyclones, salinity intrusion, landslides, and erosion. While Bangladesh has experienced tremendous economic growth over the past years, the disastrous effects of climate change have posed a consistent threat to its development.

While vulnerable communities have developed their home-grown adaptability measures to deal with natural disasters, the sheer magnitude of multiple impacts of climate change often overwhelms the traditional coping mechanisms at the local level. With only limited access to knowledge, skills, technology, and funds for climate change adaptation, as well as limited capacity to influence local development plans, vulnerable communities often find themselves unable to sufficiently adapt to the increasingly frequent and severe impacts of climate change.

Women and girls often find themselves especially vulnerable to climate change impacts, due to entrenched gender norms and reproductive responsibilities. As their average income is much lower, female-headed households spend


three times more as a share of their income on addressing the effects of climate change than households headed by men, further entrenching gender inequalities.

address these challenges, the Local Government Initiative on Climate Change (LoGIC) was developed as a multi-donor collaborative initiative of the Government of Bangladesh, UNDP, UNCDF, European Union (EU), Sweden and Denmark. LoGIC is a forward-looking solution to enhance the capacity of vulnerable communities, local government institutions, and civil society organizations for planning and financing climate change adaptation solutions in selected climatevulnerable areas. Apart from building capacity of local governments and vulnerable households, LoGIC utilizes two financing mechanisms (detailed in the next page) - the Community Resilience Fund and the Performance-Based Climate Resilience Grant - to supplement public and private financing for climate resilience.

Based on its success, as identified by independent assessments, LoGIC has been expanded to include the districts of Rangamati and Bandarban in the Chittagong Hill Tracts and is envisioning a national scale-up that will see more vulnerable communities across climate hotspots in Bangladesh supported to enhance their adaptive capacities.


### **Community Resilience Fund:**

Community Resilience Fund is a financing mechanism to build community resilience through the implementation of Climate Adaptive Livelihood Options (CALOs). This fund is utilized by the selected beneficiaries to engage in a climate adaptive business for sustainable livelihoods.



### **Performance-Based Climate Resilience Grant**

The PBCRG is a financing mechanism for local government action on climate change adaptation. These are grants from the central government (represented in Bangladesh by the Ministry of Local Government, Rural Development and Cooperatives, MLGRDC) to selected Union/Upazila Parishads, to finance local actions to build climate resilience. An example of such action is the installation of a 'Lightning Shed' in Sunamganj to prevent deaths caused by lightning in the Haor area.

I had to sell my beloved goat in order to pay for immediate medical expenses and home repairs. I persisted and managed to progress in spite of my speech impairment. For a means of support, I began caring for and selling hens. In order to better support my family, I also started working as a seamstress.

My lovely son and daughter are under the care of my unwaveringly loving mother, even if I do not have a partner at my side. I put a high focus on their wellness. In my heart, I hold a dream of owning a cow.


# **KOLPONA DAS**

My goal is to send my sons to university.




# RAHIMA KHATUN

My journey serves as a shining example of the unwavering spirit of my tenacity and that will enabled me to fight against the challenges of a changing climate.







# **JOHOR ALI**

Sunamganj

I am Johor Ali, a resident of the haor area in Sunamganj. During the monsoon season, I used to lay awake at night, my heart heavy with worry, as my young son ventured out for fishing in the haor. I couldn't rest, plagued by thoughts of what might happen if a sudden storm struck, and he found himself without shelter, at risk of drowning in the rising waters or being struck by lightning.

But today, a newfound peace has settled in my heart. When my son sets out for fishing, I can sleep soundly, knowing there is a safe place in the haor. If he senses danger, he can seek refuge in the lightning shed provided by LoGIC, and that thought alone eases my fears.

In the summer while working in the field, farmers often fall ill for not having water or having polluted water. The fear of lightning strikes while working in the fields haunted us because there was no refuge, no trees to shield us. For the lightning sheds with tube wells, we can now savor the taste of clean water and find solace in the shelter when rain and lightning strike.

When my home and fish farm were swept away by the unrelenting floodwaters in 2020, the terrible reality of climate change made me a victim. When I found myself homeless, I went to a cyclone center and stayed there for a whole year.

I sold fish and worked as a day laborer to make ends meet in order to survive. But a new chapter in my life started thanks to LoGIC's assistance. I started my own business and engaged in agricultural work, growing vegetables, and raising fish, amongst other activities.

I opened my own shop and steadily raised my social standing with the money I made from these endeavors. The goals I have for my daughter are endless; I hope one day she becomes a doctor and overcome the constraints put on her by our situation.





For years, rice dominated these fields until LoGIC's intervention subtly transformed the landscape, replacing every square inch with the vivid and vibrant yellow of mustard.

Before the installation of these pipe culverts, we grappled with the limitations of water, resulting in meager paddy harvests that left us wanting. However, thanks to the intervention, our land is now rejuvenated, and an unexpected blessing has unfolded before us.

Our toil is now rewarded in ways we never imagined. The yield per hectare has surged, and so have our incomes. An additional 50,000-60,000 Taka per hectare has graced our lives, making our efforts feel truly valued. The land now generously rewards us for the care we provide.

I experienced the severe effects of floods as a climate victim, having my home flooded. But did not let my circumstances define me.


