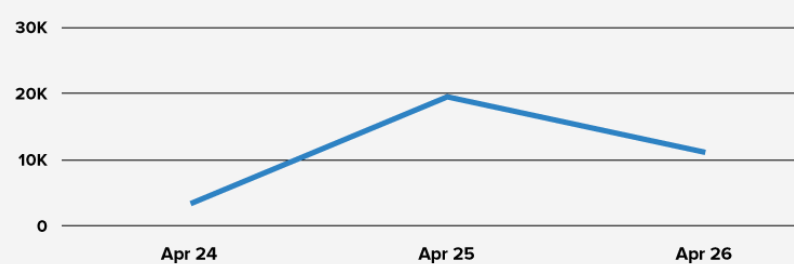


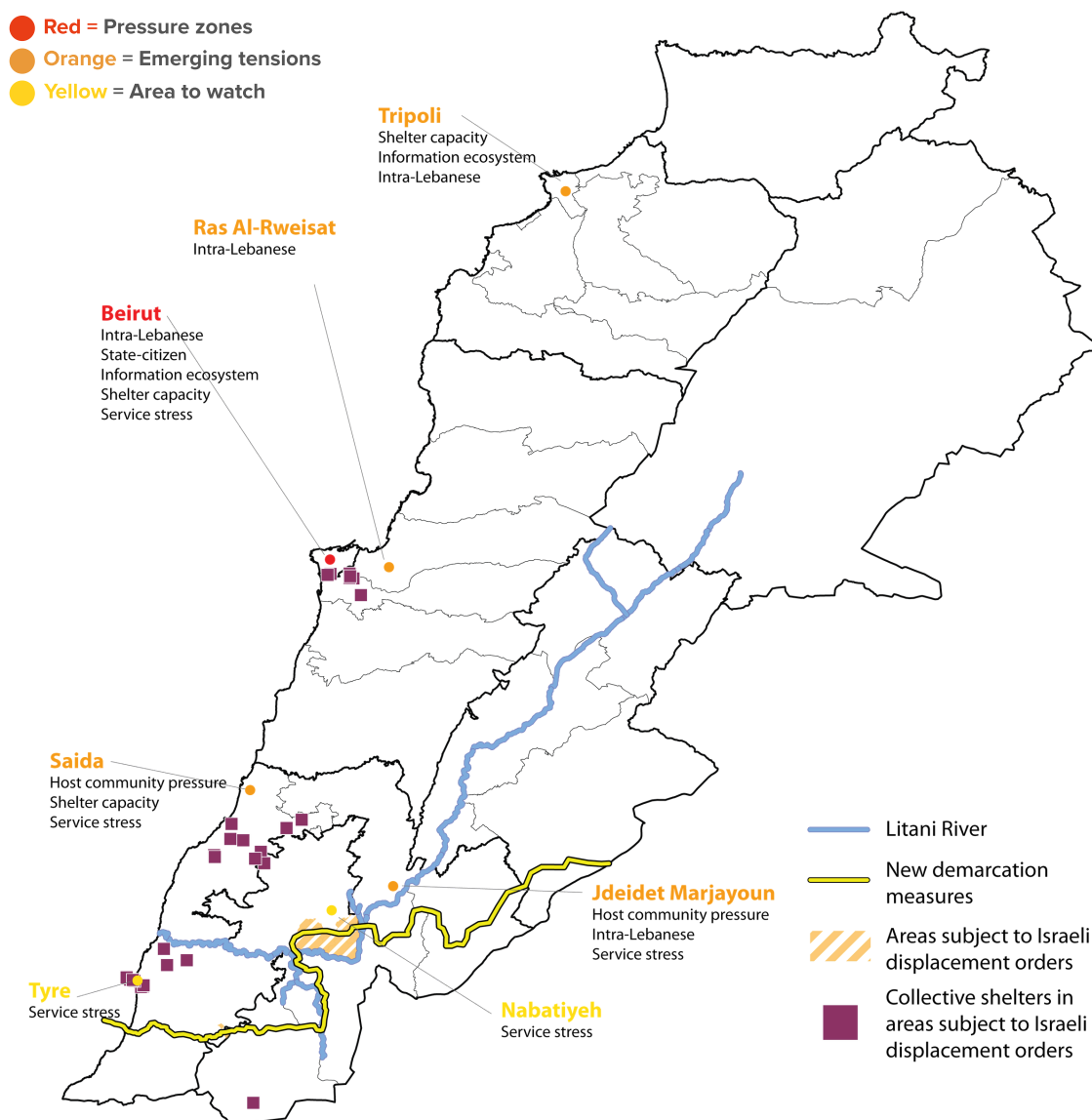
Figure 1: Engagement trend around Sakiat Al-Janizir incident

- **Sakiat Al-Janizir (Beirut) incident** prompted widespread reactions with a sectarian tone, including references to past sectarian unrest (e.g., the 7 May 2008 events in Lebanon).
- **Unverified narratives** circulated suggesting a potential float of the Lebanese pound by the Central Bank, with concerns over depreciation.
- **Mixed reactions** emerged over Government’s decision to resume in-person schooling, particularly its impact on shelter space for IDPs.
- **Ongoing airstrikes in south Lebanon** fueled concerns about security conditions, protracted displacement, and the sustainability of the ceasefire.
- **President Aoun’s message of solidarity** to President Trump following the reported shooting incident in Washington drew critical reactions, reflecting the broader sensitivities surrounding security developments in Lebanon.

## KEY SIGNALS from last 48 hours

- **New wave of displacement** following airstrikes targeting areas beyond the designated no-go area (e.g Kfartebnit).
- **A displacement order**, the first since the ceasefire extension, was issued for eight villages in the NLR.
- **State Security operation** in Sakiat Al-Janizir (Beirut) targeting inflated generator fees led to clashes with supporters of the generator owner, followed by reported road closures in Beirut and the Chouf in protest of State Security’s actions.
- **A reported personal dispute** in Ras El-Rweisat (Metn), involving a municipal police officer and a priest who intervened, took on political and sectarian overtones following allegations of Hezbollah involvement.
- Following reported warnings from the Israeli army, the Municipality of Jdeidet Marjayoun **called on non-residents to leave and/or refrain from returning** to the town on public safety grounds.

## WHAT TO WATCH



- **Emerging tensions linked to shrinking shelter options amid recurring displacement waves**
- **Vertical tensions following Government’s decision to resume in-person education in public schools that had been serving as collective shelters**
- **Rising tensions linked to resistance by IDPs in public spaces to relocate outside Beirut**
- **Possible sectarian spillover of the Sakiat Al-Janizir incident, including around investigation outcomes and communal reactions**
