ENVIRONMENTAL AND SOCIAL COMMITMENT PLAN

1. The Food and Agriculture Organization (FAO) and the United Nations Development Programme (UNDP), the World Food Programme (WFP), and the International Committee of the Red Cross (ICRC) (the Recipients or Implementing Institutions) shall (for the benefit of the Republic of Yemen) jointly implement the Yemen Food Security Response and Resilience Project (P176129) with the involvement of Implementing Partners (IPs) which include, but are not limited to: the Yemen Social Fund for Development (SFD), the Public Works Project (PWP) and Small Micro Enterprise Promotion Service (SMEPS) as set out in the Grant Agreement. The International Development Association (the Association) and the Global Agriculture and Food Security Program (GAFSP) have agreed to provide financing for the Project. This ESCP supersedes previous versions of the ESCP for the Project and shall apply both to the original and the additional financing for Project referred to above.
2. The Recipients shall ensure that the Project is carried out in accordance with the World Bank's Environmental and Social Standards (ESSs) and this Environmental and Social Commitment Plan (ESCP), in a manner acceptable to the Association. The extent and mode of the Association's monitoring with respect to environmental and social performance will be proportionate to the potential environmental and social risks and impacts of the Project. The ESCP is a part of the Financing Agreement. Unless otherwise defined in this ESCP, capitalized terms used in this ESCP have the meanings ascribed to them in the referred agreement.
3. Without limitation to the foregoing, this ESCP sets out material measures and actions that the Recipients shall carry out or cause to be carried out, including, as applicable, the timeframes of the actions and measures, institutional, staffing, training, monitoring and reporting arrangements, and grievance management. The ESCP also sets out the environmental and social (E&S) instruments that shall be adopted and implemented under the Project, all of which shall be subject to prior consultation and disclosure, consistent with the ESS, and in form and substance, and in a manner acceptable to the Association. Once adopted, said E&S instruments may be revised from time to time with prior written agreement by the Association.
4. As agreed by the Association and the Recipients, this ESCP may be revised from time to time if necessary, during Project implementation, to reflect adaptive management of Project changes and unforeseen circumstances or in response to assessment of Project performance. In such circumstances, the Recipients shall agree to the changes with the Association and update the ESCP to reflect such changes through the exchange of letters signed between the Association and the Recipients FAO, UNDP, WFP and ICRC. The Recipients shall promptly disclose the updated ESCP.
