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# **DEVELOPMENT CHALLENGES**

The unforeseen, yet persistent COVID-19 pandemic presents a humanitarian crisis threatening food security and nutrition of over half a million Namibians who were already exposed to hunger and malnutrition prior to the outbreak.

The United Nations policy brief on the Impact of COVID-19 on Food Security and Nutrition (June 2020) cautions that unless immediate action is taken to secure food for the hundreds of people who were already suffering from hunger and malnutrition, we will face a global food emergency.

The national statistics on food and nutrition security in Namibia are worrying with levels of stunting standing at 24 percent, meaning that one-quarter of the Namibian children are born malnourished and with impaired mental and physical growth. Indications are that between April and September 2020 period alone, about 360 000 people will experience severe acute food insecurity.
