Spotlight - UNDP and SEforALL team up towards affordable energy for all in the Sahel

More than 53% of Sub-Saharan Africans – about 570 million people – do not have access to electricity, as highlighted by the World Bank. In the Sahel alone, over 51% of the Sahelian population – some 175 million people - do not yet have access to electricity. Given the urgent need for action, SEforALL and UNDP are working together to support policy and regulatory frameworks and strengthen institutional capacity to unlock public and private sector investment for off-grid rural electrification, amongst other initiatives. Intended for unemployed engineering graduates and technicians, the UNDP funded Oxfam to rehabilitate and initiative builds local capacity to ensure an integrated approach to sustainably achieve the long-term national renewable energy targets.
