Many left behind by human development progress in sub-Saharan Africa



Despite outpacing global human development growth rates over 15 years, sub-Saharan Africa remains burdened by the world's most uneven distribution of development gains, with women, girls, people living in rural areas, migrants, refugees and those in conflict-affected areas systemically left behind. Gender inequality remains a serious challenge to human development in the region.

These are among the findings of the <u>Human</u> <u>Development Report 2016</u>, titled "Human Development for Everyone" released globally

on 21 March in Stockholm, Sweden. The report finds that although average human development improved significantly across all regions from 1990 to 2015, one in three people worldwide continue to live in low levels of human development as measured by the Human Development Index (HDI). Second International Conference on the Emergence of Africa (ICEA 2017)



At the second edition of the International Conference on the Emergence of Africa (ICEA), held in Abidjan, Cote d'Ivoire during 28-30 March 2017, UNDP Administrator Helen Clark emphasized that "the pursuit and promotion of emergence will accelerate human development in Africa, and is central to achieving the 2030 Agenda and Agenda 2063 on the continent."

Several Heads of State and Government and more than 800 high-level participants including 45 delegations from Africa, Asia,

and Latin America - participated in the conference, themed: *Implementation of Plans for Emergence in Africa*. Discussions took stock of Africa's achievements in building the three pillars of Emergence — (i) a developmental state, (ii) inclusive human development, and (iii) structural transformation. UNDP presented a summary of <u>thirteen-country case studies</u> on successes and challenges associated with emergence. Conference outcomes included that the Government of Côte d'Ivoire will house the newlycreated ICEA Regional Executive Secretariat; that conferences on emergence would be held every two

years on a rotating basis; and that a strategic monitoring center would be created, bringing together actors from civil society and the regional executive secretariat.

Senegal shares US\$ 200 million rural Emergency Community Development Programme experience



Representatives of 21 African countries together with bilateral and multilateral partners met in Dakar, Senegal during 13-14 March for the Africa Regional Meeting to review the achievements of the two-year, US\$ 206 million Senegal Emergency Community Development Programme (PUDC). The meeting was chaired by President Macky Sall and served as a forum to share Senegal's PUDC experience with other African countries as a model of success with profound impact on community development.

The <u>UNDP-implemented PUDC</u> aims to improve the lives of hundreds of thousands of people through providing basic social services and infrastructure. This includes building feeder roads, boreholes and water towers; rural electrification; providing agricultural and post-harvest equipment, and promoting value chains, among other activities. In his <u>opening address</u> UNDP Africa Director Abdoulaye Mar Dieye noted that the PUDC "is a perfect vector for promoting, accelerating and securing sustainable and inclusive development, a pledge of social peace." In 2016, Togo and UNDP also agreed on a <u>US\$ 258</u> million PUDC initiative.

UNDP joins forces with IBM on tech skills development for Africa's young workforce



IBM is investing US\$70 million in building much-needed digital, cloud, and cognitive IT skills to help support a 21st century workforce in Africa.

The joint UNDP – IBM initiative, "IBM Digital - Nation Africa", provides a cloud-based learning platform designed to provide free skills development programmes for up to 25 million African youths over five years, enabling digital competence and nurturing innovation in Africa. Read more here.

African Disability Forum formally registered, boosting disability rights on the continent



With the registration of the African Disability Forum, the continent now has its own legally recognized umbrella grouping of organisations of persons with disabilities to ensure that decisions concerning disabled people are taken with and by persons with disabilities, their families and their organizations at pan- African, sub-regional, national and local levels. The Forum was officially launched in 2014 and has been operating from the UNDP Regional Service Centre for Africa (RSCA). Read more here.

Portal maps successful South-South and Triangular Cooperation practices in Africa



The UNDP RSCA and the UN Office for South-South Cooperation (UNOSSC) have developed the South-South Cooperation Online Mapping Portal for Africa which provides one-stop shop access to practical, easy-to-use expertise on the broad range of existing South-South and Triangular Cooperation mechanisms and solutions in the continent.

The portal currently highlights more than 700 exchanges in different development areas between Africa and the rest of Global South.

Africa's development actors, including international agencies, public and private sector, civil society and academia, can easily showcase their successful practices through documenting their solutions on the portal.

Renewed commitment and a sub-regional approach needed for peace and stability in Central Africa



Persistent insecurity and fragility in the Central African sub-region can only be addressed if national and regional actors, as well as international partners, prioritize peace-building and development of border areas, boost citizen's engagement and participation, and improve governance indicators and management of natural resources.

These are among the recommendations of a strategic assessment report published by UNDP Africa titled "Central Africa: A Sub-

<u>Region Falling Behind?"</u> that casts a comprehensive sub-regional perspective on the challenges faced, to inform a new generation of responses both by the UN and other stakeholders. Read more <u>here</u>.

Election management and stability in Africa's divided societies



Despite elections increasingly becoming the norm across Africa, democracy remains fragile and susceptible to the threat of instability and violent conflict. Since December 2016 more than 600 Burundian youth wearing t-shirts printed with the message "I commit to peace for my country" have been busy rehabilitating roads, and cleaning and constructing drainage systems in parts of the capital city Bujumbura to help build stronger community ties to reinforce peace. The cash-for-work initiative is part of the Community Protection and Social Cohesion Support Project that is supported by UNDP and other partners, which, if scaled-up could go a long way in improving livelihoods

and contributing to peace and social cohesion in the Great Lakes region in the context of the <u>UN Great Lakes Regional Strategic Framework</u>. Read more <u>here</u>.

65 Muslim scholars commit to tackling the spread of violent extremism in West and Central Africa



To help address the threat of violent extremism in their regions, 65 Muslim scholars from West and Central Africa have signed up to the Abuja Declaration on Countering and Preventing Violent Extremism that includes more transparent mosque management, the participation of women and youth in decision-making processes, and training of religious leaders and institutions to deliver content more

effectively.

The Declaration was agreed after a two-day conference chaired by the Sultan of Sokoto and President-General of the Nigerian Supreme Council for Islamic Affairs His Eminence Alhaji Muhammadu Sa'ad Abubakar in the Nigerian capital during 17-18 October 2016. The UNDP Africa-supported meeting drew participants from Cameroon, Central African Republic, Chad, Mauritania, Niger, Nigeria and Senegal. Read more here.

Is there a better way to measure resourcedependence?

UNDP RSCA The recent El Niño and La Niña phenomena have affected millions of people across several countries, and key climate-reliant sectors such as agriculture, water resources, energy and infrastructure have been impacted. Developing countries in Africa are among the most affected by climate change impacts, and yet remain among the least prepared to respond or cope when disaster strikes. Several researchers have come up with indicators to measure resource-dependency. They look at shares of resource exports in GDP or in total exports; resource revenue as a share of total government revenue and extractive value-added in GDP. These traditional measures however do not consider the contribution of other sectors to foreign income, taxes or to domestic value addition. Dependence on resource incomes is only problematic if other sectors are relatively weaker. This is what our Extractives Dependence Index (EDI) tries to correct. Read the full blog here.
