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## RCB Highlights in 2005

- **Aid coordination** capacity of tsunami-affected countries enhanced by supporting the customisation and installation of 4 government-owned aid tracking systems, based on UNDP's Development Assistance Database (DAD) model

## Introduction

The Regional Centre in Bangkok's (RCB) Annual Report 2005 highlights the RCB team's major advisory and knowledge services as well as other activities in support of Country Offices (COs) in the Asia-Pacific region from **January to December 2005**.

This report is divided into sections by practice: governance, energy and environment, crisis prevention and recovery, (tsunami, avian influenza and the South Asia earthquake response), and management, and by focus areas: ICT4D and South-South Cooperation, communications and knowledge services (expert referrals, knowledge products and events). Regional programme financial status and staff build-up are also covered.

## The Asia-Pacific Region in 2005: An Overview

2005 was a year that witnessed Asia's valiant efforts to rise above the tsunami waves set off by the earthquake off the Sumatra coast on 26 December 2004, and scale Himalayan heights to bring succour to the victims of another major earthquake that struck Pakistan and Kashmir on 8 October 2005. The tsunami of 26 December 2004 was a natural disaster of unprecedented scale, in terms of the number of lives that it took, and the millions left homeless from Aceh in Indonesia to Andhra Pradesh in India. Aceh and North Sumatra lost the greatest number of lives. The tsunami took lives that could have been saved, if only the region had recognised sooner the real extent of its connectedness, and had taken steps to put in place warning systems for natural disasters. The Special ASEAN Leaders' Meeting held in Jakarta on 6 January 2005 recognised that the devastation would need an unprecedented global response to assist national governments' efforts in emergency relief, rehabilitation and reconstruction that could take five to ten years, and agreed to establish a warning system for the region. The World Conference on Disaster Reduction, held in Kobe, Japan, in January 2005, adopted the Hyogo Framework for Action 2005-2015, calling on all countries to integrate disaster risk into political agendas and national policies.

The tsunami catastrophe exposed critical weaknesses in governance in the affected countries, forcing some to address long-lasting internal conflicts with greater urgency, but also with a renewed sense of reality. In Indonesia, the Government has reached a tentative peace accord at Helsinki with the separatist Free Aceh Movement (GAM) to end 30 years of fighting. In Sri Lanka, the Government agreed to a joint tsunami relief-monitoring mission with the Liberation Tigers of Tamil Eelam (LTTE), despite strong opposition from within its ranks and continuing uncertainty over prospects for constitutional resolution of the conflict. In Thailand, the Government has shown more sensitivity to the human rights of tsunami victims, including migrants who had earlier been slated for deportation. The Maldives is among the worst affected with per capita reconstruction costs estimated to be higher than in other countries. The tsunami response in the Maldives (and in the other countries) should result in a more efficient and transparent public procurement system. In India, Hindus, Muslims and Christians helped one another as never before to overcome entrenched forms of discrimination based on religion, gender and caste. The importance of governance of the kind that is responsive, accountable, participative and transparent, to secure the well being of people, during disasters and in normal times, has come to the forefront.

There have been other upheavals in national governance. The Maldives People's Assembly is considering constitutional reforms to strengthen fundamental rights, entrench multiparty democracy, separation of powers, effective parliamentary governance, judicial independence, and human rights. Mongolia has blazed a trail by formally adopting the Millennium Development Goals (MDGs), and an additional goal on the Millennium Declaration's commitment to democracy, good governance and human rights. Bhutan has initiated a

process of securing public consent and legitimacy to a new constitution to replace absolute monarchy with a constitutional monarchy, human rights guarantees, democratic elections, and a two-party political system, enabling an effective opposition to the party in power. The presidential election in Iran passed off peacefully, but discussions over the nuclear programme continues to keep Iran in the news.

There have been some setbacks during the report period. In Thailand, a different kind of crisis is festering, as the government takes a hard-line approach to Muslim rebellion in the far South. The National Reconciliation Commission (NRC) has warned the Government against excessive use of emergency powers. In Nepal, a *coup* on 1 February 2005, in which the King took over absolute power, has demonstrated the vulnerability of democracy to crises of legitimacy, brought about most often by inequity and discriminatory treatment of population groups and regions. The Philippines witnessed another upsurge of "people's power" against the President following allegations of electoral malpractices. The importance of constitutionally established means for bringing about changes in political leadership has come to the fore. Apart from political and natural disaster shocks of the kind mentioned above, the region remains vulnerable to economic and humanitarian shocks. Memories of the Asian financial crisis, and before that, the "oil shocks", have not faded. In 2005, rising oil prices continue to be a major threat to economic development. HIV/AIDS is a threat to the prosperity of India and China. Avian influenza threatens to explode into a pandemic in Southeast Asia, from which the numbers of victims could dwarf those of the tsunami. However, the rising awareness of its seriousness among Asia-Pacific decision-makers and senior officials, in both national governments and international bodies, has triggered unprecedented regional cooperation in making large-scale preparations.

The UN General Assembly recently endorsed a declaration made by Small Island Developing States (SIDS) requesting expanded trade opportunities, assistance in coping with sea-level rise, and other adverse consequences of climate change, and for renewable energy and cleaner fossil fuel technologies. The WTO declaration adopted in Hong Kong on 18 December 2005 contains agreements by the developed and large developing countries such as Brazil, China and India to allow duty-free, quota-free access to exports from the least developed countries (LDCs). But importing countries are allowed to set exceptions, applied to crucial products such as textiles, sugar and rice. With unfinished business from Hong Kong, and a U.N. General Assembly five-year review of the Brussels action plan in September 2006, much remains to be done to benefit the LDCs most in need of economic justice and international support.

Globalisation has highlighted the importance of regional cooperation. Cooperative mechanisms, such as ASEAN and SAARC, continue to retain sensitivity about principles of sovereignty and non-intervention in the domestic affairs of other states. Conventional approaches to South-South cooperation should give way to innovations. "In an increasingly interconnected world, progress in the areas of development, security and human rights must go hand in hand" (*In Larger Freedom*, Kofi Annan, 2005). The potential of ASEAN for moving Myanmar towards democracy, respect for human rights, and good governance, is a case in point.

Governance in Asia-Pacific has become an important 'global public good'. Uneven development, corruption and consequent lack of legitimacy of the state, are the most serious among the dangers faced by many countries in the region. These factors, more than any others, tend to produce the phenomenon of "fragile states". Asian countries are addressing these problems, and realise that the achievement of the MDGs, uniformly across population groups and regions is critical. Throughout the region, there is a strong link between poverty, gender inequity and the poor survival rates and wellbeing of the region's children and women.

The importance of multi-sectoral success for the achievement of the MDGs and the critical need for democracy, development, fulfilment of human rights and good governance, emphasised in the Millennium Declaration and at the Millennium Summit, and reiterated in *In Larger Freedom*, are evident all over Asia.

## Democratic Governance

### Strategic Objectives in 2005<sup>1</sup>

1. Increased effectiveness of **representative bodies** at central and sub-national levels to perform their democratic functions and enhance national poverty reduction goals
  2. **Poor and disadvantaged groups** including indigenous peoples, empowered to seek remedies for injustices and **justice** institutions enabled to be responsive to claims, consistent with international **human rights** norms
- Public administration** reform for efficient, effective, responsive and pro-poor public services promoted at central and local levels

### Increased effectiveness of representative bodies at central and sub-national levels to perform their democratic functions and enhance national poverty reduction goals

Representative systems at local and sub-national levels were given a special focus in 2005 both at a programming and policy advisory level. A regional retreat on Representation in Decentralised Governance and Local Service Delivery was held in June 2005, with case studies to be prepared as a result of participant feedback on improving and widening representation at local levels and in turn improving accountability. Leveraging the consolidated regional practice on representation in decentralised governance, the RCB has provided advice to a number of countries. The Government of the Maldives has decided to create local governance authorities with local councils established and empowered drawing on the advice provided by an RCB-led team. The RCB Governance team under this objective also focused on the role of parliamentarians in conflict and post-conflict situations, with case studies from nine COs considered completed and disseminated. These findings will be fed into a donor meeting in Brussels in early 2006.

The RCB sponsored the participation of members of electoral commissions from seven Asian countries to attend a meeting of the Asian Association of Electoral Commissions (AAEA) held in Taipei. Policy advisory services in the area of local governance have been provided through missions to Nepal, Cambodia, Sri Lanka, Thailand, Iran and the Maldives. In Sri Lanka, Maldives and Thailand, the local governance dimension of tsunami recovery received special attention. Advocacy work has been undertaken to promote the ratification of the UN Convention against Corruption. The RCB sponsored parliamentarians from ASEAN to Manila for the first meeting of Southeast Asian Parliamentarians against Corruption (SEAPAC). It resulted in a Constitution for SEAPAC, and the Manila Declaration against Corruption and Action Plan for Follow Up.

Another area being pursued is on Parliamentary Knowledge Services. The Canadian Parliamentary Centre is undertaking a study on comparative experiences of parliamentary knowledge services for the Asian region. The study will be completed in early 2006 and is expected to assist COs in further developing this hitherto under-emphasised area of parliamentary development. Research on violence in elections and on electoral dispute mechanisms is underway in close cooperation with the Bureau for Development Policy and policy institutes in the region.

The RCB is also focussing on Youth and Young Leaders. Responding to the identified need to look at the linkages between youth, governance and the achievement of the MDGs (a priority reaffirmed by the DG Advisory Panel), RCB, assisted by UNDP Philippines, held an initial

*Planning Meeting on Developing a Plan of Action on Youth, Governance and the MDGs for Asia and the Pacific* on 12-14 December in Manila. Participants from the region included representatives from five COs in the region, and the Regional Centre in Colombo. Representatives from UNDP Argentina and the Bratislava Regional Centre as well as the Global Youth Action Network and Philippine organizations also participated, enriching the discussion with perspectives from other regions, youth and civil society. The meeting served to identify current needs with regard to youth and governance in the region as well as to identify outputs and activities, and the way forward in this area. The meeting also served as a first step in building a community around this area. A Leadership Training Event encompassing five days was held in Thailand for Young Leaders from 20 countries in the Asia Pacific region, focussing on leadership skills, ethics, governance, human rights and negotiation. A cross-section of leaders from all walks of life (parliamentarians, NGOs, private sector, international organizations, etc.) were invited after nomination by UNDP COs. Follow-up activities on regional and national levels will be supported in 2006.

**Poor and disadvantaged groups including indigenous peoples, empowered to seek remedies for injustices and justice institutions enabled to be responsive to claims, consistent with international human rights norms**

The promotion of inclusive governance and rights-based approaches (RBAs) including institutional strengthening particularly for disadvantaged groups was emphasised in 2005 within the area of Access to Justice and Human Rights. A regional initiative was launched to document cases of inclusive governance for disadvantaged groups as a collaborative effort between the Asia Regional Governance Programme (ARGP), Asia Pacific Gender Mainstreaming Programme (APGMP) and the Regional Indigenous Peoples' Programme (RIPP) together with ten COs in the region. In Maldives, the RCB also supported the first National Human Rights Survey of Maldives, through both policy advice and funding, and the inclusion of RBA in the National Development Plan. Policy advice has been provided to the Maldives' Ministry of Justice on its justice reform programme. Advice has been provided to Bhutan on its constitution, as well as to India and Cambodia on A2J.

The regional publication "Programming for Justice: Access for All - A Practitioner's Guide to a Human Rights Based Approach to Access to Justice" has been completed and distributed to COs. Its launch took place together with training on RBAs to Access to Justice (A2J) on 22-24 September 2005 in Phnom Penh. Eighteen COs from Asia-Pacific attended, together with government representatives and resource people from academia and civil society. In cooperation with Office of the High Commissioner for Human Rights (OHCHR), a regional consultation on "Lessons Learned from RBAs in the Asia Pacific" was held on 19-21 September 2005 with representatives from UN agencies and NGOs in the region. A follow-up phase will be carried out with funding from UNICEF, UNESCO, SIDA, OHCHR and UNDP to pilot RBA activities in several countries in Asia. This inter-agency collaboration on human rights is a unique arrangement that should be replicated elsewhere.

In the area of Indigenous Peoples' Rights and Development, technical assistance was provided to Indonesia with advice to the CO on policy and programming, and briefings with the Ministry of Social Affairs and the National Human Rights Commission, resulting in endorsement of the Programme. A study of national and local government regulations and laws affecting indigenous peoples is underway with involvement of Indigenous People's Organisations and relevant government counterparts.

Similar advice and assistance was provided to the Department of Ethnic Minorities of the Ministry of Rural Development in Cambodia to guide development activities in the highland

regions. A mechanism for dialogue—an indigenous peoples’ forum has been created. In Bangladesh, the RCB works in close cooperation with the CO including UNDP Chittagong Hill Tracts Development Facility and the Ministry of Chittagong Hill Tracts Affairs with linkages to indigenous peoples’ organisations. Participatory research on inclusive governance is currently underway in a number of countries including Bangladesh, Cambodia, India, Indonesia, Nepal, Thailand and the Philippines.

In cooperation with the regional gender programme, a series of training activities for indigenous women on decision making processes are underway. Bangladesh and Malaysia have held national trainings with a further two identified for support in 2006. In response to a request received from indigenous peoples’ organisations at the United Nations Permanent Forum on Indigenous Issues in May 2005, a process of dialogue with international financial

***Indonesia – Promoting indigenous peoples’ rights and development***

Indigenous peoples are among the most culturally diverse, yet most impoverished. The challenge is to give voice to indigenous peoples and build more inclusive governance structures.

UNDP is piloting a regional programme on indigenous peoples’ rights and development using the human rights based approach and multi-stakeholder dialogue, including with IFIs and UN ECOSOC’s Permanent Forum on Indigenous Issues. It is unique to Asia, and the first of its kind in the UN system.

**Result** – In Indonesia, RCB policy support catalyzed the Government, the National Commission on Human Rights and indigenous organizations to come together, and a new law accommodating the needs and aspirations of indigenous peoples is being formulated.

institutions, complemented by training sessions on the RBAs is in process. A regional workshop attended by representatives of the International Financial Institutions (IFIs) and indigenous leaders from throughout the region was held, and a task force established to develop a training manual for awareness raising and capacity development among indigenous

organizations.

The Asia Regional Governance Programme (ARGP) support to the Philippines CO enabled UNDP to join the World Bank and ADB as co-sponsor of a conference of chief justices, organised by the Philippines Supreme Court on 28-30 November. The conference attracted 150 participants, including 29 chief justices, most of them from the Asia-Pacific region. The UNDP Administrator delivered a video-recorded message to the conference focusing on the links between judicial reforms, human rights and human development. The Manila Declaration, adopted by the conference, signals the commitment of judiciaries in the region to accelerate judicial reforms, aimed at improving access to, and better delivery of, justice, especially to the poor and other disadvantaged groups. One session was devoted to the UNDP Asia-Pacific Access to Justice (AP-A2J) network, and the programming guide on the human rights based approach, and introduced to delegates by Justice Kenneth Hayne, High Court of Australia. The conference created the Asia Pacific Judicial Reform Forum to follow up on the Manila Declaration. In 2006, the ARGP, along with APDIP, anticipates support for a tool-kit on judicial reforms to be produced under the auspices of the newly established forum.

RCB, in collaboration with the Institute for Democracy and Electoral Assistance, (IDEA) Stockholm, and the Institute for Constitutional Development (INCOD), responded to demand from many countries in the region for comparative lessons from other regions on constitution-making processes. With ARGP support, an inter-regional workshop on the subject was organised in Pretoria, South Africa on 8-10 December.

## **e-Government and e-Governance**

In partnership with the China's State Council Informatization Office (SCITO), UNDP China and Cisco Systems organised the 2nd annual Asia-Pacific Public Services Summit in Beijing to address key critical questions on implementation challenges of e-government applications and the need for public sector reform and good governance. The summit was attended by some 160 participants from 18 Asia-Pacific countries (<http://www.apdip.net/news/appss1>). APDIP and RCB's governance team has initiated two regional initiatives on Networking of Asian Parliamentarians and a Judicial Reform Network of 21<sup>st</sup> Century (JRN21). In addition an initiative on pro-poor public service delivery through e-governance was conceptualized. In cooperation with United Nations Centre for Regional Development, APDIP is implementing a project on Capacity Building of Asia-Pacific e-Government Initiatives with 13 participating countries each contributing two case studies. APDIP also contributed to a number of e-government conferences as keynote speaker and resource people among others the International Symposium on E-government in Seoul (8 November 2005) and COMNET Viet Nam (14-15 December 2005).

### **Public administration reform for efficient, effective, responsive, and pro-poor public services promoted**

In the Public Administration Reform and Anti-Corruption area, beyond the above-mentioned cross-practice linking of parliamentarians and anti-corruption, support has been provided to, among others, Mongolia, Lao PDR and Sri Lanka—the latter with regard to tsunami recovery. In June 2005, the RCB mounted a comprehensive five-person two-week mission to Mongolia in collaboration with the Oslo Governance Centre. Advisory services were also provided to Maldives, Cambodia, Vietnam and Lao PDR. Comprehensive research was conducted on public administration reform in the Asia-Pacific region and a comparative study on institutional mechanisms for combating corruption has been finalised. Collaboration with the ADB-OECD Asia Pacific Anti-Corruption Initiative has been strengthened through the RCB membership in the Initiative's Steering Committee and participation in the 5<sup>th</sup> Regional Anti-Corruption Conference.

Joint activities in the area of anti-corruption were also undertaken with the Bratislava Regional Centre As a follow-up to the Asia-Pacific Least Developed Country (LDC) Governance Paper (2004), the RCB also contributed to the drafting of a Global Report on Governance in the 50 LDCs.

The report, which is being produced by a joint BDP-RCB-OHRLLS, emphasizes the critical importance of democratic governance in overcoming the salient challenges faced by the

#### ***Mongolia – “MDG9” on Good Governance and zero tolerance for corruption***

Billions of dollars' worth of development gains disappear every year as a result of corruption and money laundering. Anti-corruption activities are thus an important area of RCB's work in the Asia-Pacific.

The RCB advisory services fielded by the Mongolia CO have supported Mongolia's anti-corruption working group. Additional inputs have come from an RCB demand-driven comparative study and the fostering of partnerships with UN Office for Drugs and Crime, the ADB-OECD Anti-Corruption Initiative for Asia-Pacific, Transparency International and others.

**Result** – Mongolia became the first country to adopt an MDG9 on democratic governance and zero tolerance for corruption. The Mongolian parliament has now ratified the UN Convention Against Corruption and is currently debating a new anti-corruption law. The sharing of the Mongolian MDG 9 experience within Asia-Pacific has captured the attention of Samoa and Timor-Leste, and has also led to the establishment of a new regional community of practice on “Integrity in Action”, through which capacity will be built for implementation of the UN Convention Against Corruption.

poorest countries in the world, 14 of which are in the Asia-Pacific region. Cross-practice activities in this service line are increasingly being undertaken with the RCB Capacity Development team.

Missions of a multi-disciplinary nature, consisting of members from different practice teams within the RCB, were undertaken to Sri Lanka and Timor-Leste. In Timor-Leste, a comprehensive programme to strengthen national capacities for public service management has been developed, and is currently being discussed with the Government and other development partners. The RCB also provided advice on the design of an institutional support project to the Office of the President.

#### **Regional support to local service delivery for MDGs**

The MDGs can be achieved only with major improvements in public service delivery locally. However, there is surprisingly little attention to both the constraints and opportunities for promoting the role of local governments in this agenda - especially in rural areas where MDG challenges are the greatest.

Rather than undertake a set of academic case studies, the regional strategy in Asia-Pacific has been to descend one level and to promote a set of consultative research & advocacy exercises which engage key policy-makers and local government practitioners and create an embryonic local governance network.

**Result** – The network has been infused with cross-country exchange and regional advocacy on policy constraints and policy innovations that work, and practical policy guidelines have been developed to serve as a basis for reforming local government policy and financing frameworks, and to allow local governments to play their role in attaining MDGs 1-7.

The RCB also focuses on analysing policy lessons on local service delivery for attainment of the MDGs. The objective of the exercise is to document and disseminate specific operational and policy lessons, especially in rural areas, both from the supply and demand side, on improving access to those local services necessary for poverty reduction and attainment of the MDGs.

The RCB is also engaged in the financing aspects of local service delivery for the MDGs. It has drafted the new global primer on Fiscal Decentralisation and Poverty Reduction, and has moderated a UNDP Global Network discussion on the topic. The regional practice team is defining the UNDP niche and entry points in this area.

To this end, a regional workshop was held in December on “Financing Local Service Delivery for the MDGs: Challenges and Opportunities” in New

Delhi at the National Institute of Public Finance and Policy (NIPFP). This was a joint initiative of the RCB and UNCDF, in partnership with the NIPFP. Fifteen countries participated. There were two substantive themes of the presentations and discussions: the financing of service delivery/fiscal decentralization, and institutional issues (e.g. accountability) around decentralization. RCB also presented its proposal for country case studies follow-up to be undertaken during 2006. In this regard, a parallel complementary study is also underway to analyse experiences with participatory monitoring of service delivery.

#### **Public-Private Partnerships for Urban Environment (PPPUE)**

PPPUE’s activities complemented the Governance Team’s efforts in the area of public sector reform promotion for efficient, effective, responsive and pro-poor services at central and local levels. The Programme represented RCB in two regional events, namely the Commonwealth Local Government Forum’s Asia-Pacific Regional Symposium on “Better local services: Improving local government delivery through innovation and partnerships” and the Fourth Asia-Pacific Urban Forum “Making MDGs Work for Cities”, where it raised awareness and interest of participants in local level PPP as a practical solution to deliver basic services to the



poor. In the latter event, PPPUE, in addition, sponsored the participation of the Nepal National PPPUE Programme Manager as a key resource person.

At the country level, the Programme through its Flexible Response Mechanism (FRM) facility supported:

- a) the Bhutan CO in implementing a project on “Developing a Policy Framework for Public-Private Partnerships for Urban Environment Management in Thimphu”. Key project outputs are: a Steering Committee; a video programme on Urban Waste Management issues within the Bhutanese context produced and aired on National TV; and an initial review of the existing laws, rules, regulations and policy on urban services was completed;
- b) the Iran CO in exploring new approaches that entail the participation of the private sector and civil society in the delivery of basic urban services to poor and informal settlements of two selected municipalities. Key outputs are: the PPPUE toolkit “Tools for Pro-Poor Municipal PPP” translated and published in Farsi (Persian) and disseminated through the Iran Association of Municipalities; two regional multi-stakeholder workshops.

Technical support and guidance was provided to COs in the region in developing their PPPUE projects and to effectively apply for its second wave of Innovative Partnerships Grant (IPG) support. Cambodia, India and the Philippines COs were selected to receive the Grant to test-experiment with PPP arrangements of delivering services to the poor. CO focal points together with their lead implementing partner organisations’ representatives were invited to attend a week-long orientation meeting in Johannesburg, where PPP concept, frameworks and options, its pro-poor and MDG dimensions, and implications for policy, institutional and regulatory changes were examined. The Programme’s efforts were also directed towards an analysis of demand in the region for such support, and areas were identified for intervention.

### **Aid Coordination and Management**

The RCB’s Aid Coordination team has focused since March 2005 on responding to the pressing needs of tsunami-affected countries to enhance their national aid coordination capacities. UNDP proposed a package of aid coordination support at the *High-Level Coordination Meeting on Rehabilitation and Reconstruction of Tsunami-affected Countries* hosted in March 2005 by the ADB in Manila. In April 2005, UNDP received requests for support from the Governments of Sri Lanka, Maldives and Thailand. These centred on assisting these Governments in reinforcing their coordination staff and capacity, and customising a tsunami resources and results tracking system to meet their specific needs. By June 2005, customised versions of the Development Assistance Database (DAD) were installed and operational within the Government departments in all three countries and available on-line to the public. In September 2005, the Government of Indonesia requested the RCB to provide similar policy and technical support to its reconstruction authority in Aceh (BRR). The Recovery Aceh/Nias Database (RAN, as the DAD is called there) was publicly launched in Aceh on 28 October 2005. Data on all projects is accessible to all through the Internet, either by accessing the four operational DADs directly or through the Government-run websites, with weekly reports published automatically to the site.

The country-level tsunami work has been brought together within a single window whereby data on resources and results from all four countries can be analysed through maps, charts and reports in the Regional Tsunami DAD based in the RCB (<http://tsunamitracking.undp.or.th/dadregional>). Information on all four countries as well as pre-defined reports and charts from the national DADs can also be accessed through a regional tsunami web portal (<http://tsunamitracking.org>), which presents relevant information in a user-friendly, easily accessible manner. In November, an additional Regional Tsunami Aid Coordination Advisor, a Regional Tsunami Aid Tracking Analyst and a Regional Tsunami Private Sector Coordinator joined the team, thus bolstering the RCB's capacity to respond to tsunami needs and unmet needs from COs and partner Governments beyond tsunami-affected countries. In the latter half of 2005, the Aid Coordination team began to respond to requests not directly related to the tsunami. The team has fielded missions to Vietnam, India and Pakistan. The RCB support to Pakistan immediately after the South Asia earthquake focused on practical advice on how to establish an effective and efficient aid coordination mechanism for recovery assistance as rapidly as possible. This will result in a full-fledged package of aid coordination support during 2006 led by the Country Office, supported by the RCB team. With respect to Vietnam and India, there is scope to make progress regarding the:

- harmonisation and alignment agenda consolidated in Paris in March 2005; and,
- integration of aid within a national budget framework reflecting the priorities of national MDG-based Poverty Reduction Strategies.

In each country, the RCB and CO collaboration seeks to develop a package of support that is tailored closely to the specific national requirements. The package marries capacity development measures and policy advice with customised aid and budget tracking technology. The Governments of Maldives, India and Vietnam have expressed their interest in fostering the linkage between official development assistance (ODA) and the respective national public investment programme through a more sophisticated public finance management system. In December, the Aid Coordination team organized a Knowledge Sharing Workshop on *Lessons Learnt on Tsunami Aid Coordination* in Bangkok, which brought together aid coordination advisers and practitioners from different countries.

### **Gender Mainstreaming**

The Asia Pacific Gender Mainstreaming Programme (APGMP), hosted at the Regional Centre in Colombo (RCC), has been working closely with regional programmes and practice teams based at the Regional Centre in Bangkok. In addition, the two Bangkok-based members of the Gender team have been providing continuous policy support and technical backstopping to COs in the region on documents, policy notes and in developing proposals for funding. In the area of **governance**, APGMP is currently working with the regional programmes on governance and indigenous peoples on a regional series highlighting inclusive governance which will feature case studies from Afghanistan, Iran and Tonga. These focus on exploring issues on women's access to resources and basic rights as well as the reasons for their exclusion from the democratic processes.

The gender programme in partnership with the Regional Indigenous Peoples' Programme (RIPP) has initiated a country-exchange between Bangladesh and Malaysia to train indigenous women in decision-making and provide them with the opportunity to learn from each others' experiences and facilitate a broader comprehension of their rights towards building their capability to protect such rights when violated. The APGMP completed a training workshop on Gender Responsive Budgeting to provide a platform for government representatives, CSOs, researchers and academics from 14 countries in the region to dialogue on work that has

already been done in countries in this area and to develop a way forward on gender responsive budgets, and the availability and use of disaggregated data. The APGMP also partnered other regional programmes to carry out a training course for young leaders in governance.

There is a special emphasis on young women in order to further capacitate them with leadership skills in their area of work as parliamentarians, journalists, activists, etc. In other practice areas (**ICT, Energy and Environment**), the Gender team co-hosted a workshop on 'Mapping Gender in the Information Society' with **APDIP** in Bangkok as a preparatory meeting for the World Summit on the Information Society (WSIS). It brought together activists from the academic and grassroots level to dialogue on the gender perspectives of the WSIS and to articulate the gender concerns that exist in the information society into the WSIS debate.

Furthermore, the Gender team provided technical support to the **Energy and Environment** team to reflect gender perspectives in the energy rapid assessment and gap analysis initiative for the region. The two regional centres also co-hosted a regional gender thematic trust fund project. As part of the project, a synthesis paper on gender mainstreaming in UNDP practice areas was completed through ten country cases from the region. This was subsequently shared at a regional workshop with participation from 14 COs, both regional centres and HQs.

### **Capacity Development in the Governance Programme Area**

Capacity development has been increasingly positioned as cross-cutting to other practice areas and this is reflected in the integrated work plan of the Regional Centres in Bangkok and Colombo. The tsunami brought to light critical capacity gaps in the area of governance, further detailed below in the Crisis Prevention and Recovery (CPR) section. Significant capacity development inputs have been provided in the areas of legislatures and elections. COs also demanded enhancement of capacities for working on indigenous peoples' issues including strengthening of the policy framework pertaining to indigenous peoples. Capacity 2015 has looked to pilot innovations and new approaches in development that lend themselves to scaling up and enhancing knowledge. Lessons from on-the-ground initiatives and from policy forums have been captured and codified into programming guidelines, toolkits and other resource materials that help to 'operationalise' capacity development.

The focus of capacity development support to the Governance team has been in the area of public sector management (PSM). The Capacity Development team has been supporting the development of three country programmes in Sri Lanka (related to tsunami recovery), Timor-Leste and Afghanistan. In each of these cases, support to developing programmes with a thrust on developing national capacity was emphasised. The particular focus of the Capacity Development team has been to provide know-how on capacity assessments that establish baseline capacities in the civil

#### ***Bangladesh and Malaysia – Strengthening the role of women in decision-making***

Women need to be involved in decisions that affect them, their families and communities. Indigenous women face the triple burden of discrimination on the basis of gender, ethnicity and social status.

Building on UNDP country office and civil society efforts, a training programme, aimed at developing women's confidence and capacity to engage in decision-making, has been conducted in indigenous peoples' areas in Bangladesh (Chittagong Hill Tracts) and Malaysia (Sabah). The training is oriented to informing them of their rights, thereby raising awareness of their position and potential in society. The training is complemented by enabling women from the two areas to exchange experiences.

**Results** – Women have been enabled to play a meaningful role in decision-making, and have learned from each other's skills and experiences.

service and forward planning. This support comes in the form of providing toolkits and hands on advice to Ministries and/or actors in the civil service. In the area of Local Governance, the team has recently started an initiative with the Galing Pook Foundation in the Philippines to institute an award recognising innovations in capacity development at the local level in support of achieving the MDGs. In the Access to Justice area, the Capacity Development team has delivered sessions on integrating capacity development and rights-based approaches in development. In Cambodia, Capacity 2015 in partnership with the country office has developed a video on the experiences and lessons learned in strengthening capacities of the government's local fisheries offices and the communities in managing community fishery resources.

### National policy frameworks that reflect environmental and energy access considerations in poverty reduction and sustainable development strategies established

The environment-poverty linkage was the main focus of the environmental mainstreaming work. A project development workshop was held in Bangkok involving CO focal points and major development partners (ESCAP, UNEP, ADB and IUCN) in March 2005. The Poverty Environment Initiative (PEI) was subsequently launched at the Ministerial Conference on Environment and Development in Seoul in April 2005. PEI meetings were held in Bhutan and Bangladesh to provide a dialogue space for the integration of environmental concerns of the poor into national policy planning and to create a better understanding of how poverty-environment (P-E) activities have been carried out in the region.

These meetings were also attended by representatives from Mongolia, Lao PDR, Cambodia, Sri Lanka and Nepal. A preparatory assistance (PA) document was drafted in collaboration with the RCC and COs. The PA contemplates support to a number of studies on poverty – environment linkages, in relation to UNDP programmes. In addition, the environment-governance linkages were explored with a view to embracing community-based approaches to natural resource management and sustainable development through policy recommendations and practical measures that will emphasise access, control and management of natural resources as well as the role of formal and informal institutions in shaping people's resource endowments and entitlements. Specific activities included: preparatory work for cross-border community dialogue in the Lower Mekong region; the completion of five environmental governance case studies at the local level in Nepal, Philippines, Samoa, Thailand and Mongolia; a launch of seven environmental governance pilots in Sri Lanka, Maldives, Timor-Leste, China, Pakistan, Indonesia and Cambodia; targeted policy advice to UNDP Indonesia on mainstreaming environmental strategy and tsunami response; and, review of Cambodia National Sustainable

#### **Community dialogues across frontiers**

Communities sometimes suffer in silence. Along both banks of the huge Mekong river, villagers are concerned about the steady erosion of the river which is literally eating into their livelihoods.

The RCB's regional environmental governance programme was launched to empower local communities to take part in the decision making processes that may impact the environment, and to ensure fair access to natural resources. One of its initiatives relies on RCB working with local UN volunteers identified by the country offices of Thailand, Lao PDR, and Cambodia to facilitate community-to-community dialogues among three river-bank communities.

**Results** – Communities discovered many commonalities through their talks and exchanged ideas. They learned, were empowered, and have developed strategies based on which they are taking their causes to their respective local authorities.

Development Plan and Sri Lanka's MDG Report. National Capacity Self Assessment (NCSA) project development support and implementation assistance, which helps countries to identify their capacity development priorities in order to effectively fulfil their global environmental commitments, were provided to 30 countries in the region. As a follow up to the NCSA process, support to the development of GEF funded cross-cutting capacity development projects were provided to five countries – Philippines, Cambodia, Bhutan, Lao PDR and Vietnam.

Support for mainstreaming played a key role in the RCB's efforts to assist country offices in the region with programming, including the development of a major mainstreaming programme in Afghanistan, and virtual support in Cambodia and Sri Lanka. Under the Regional Energy Programme for Poverty Reduction (REP-PoR), technical assistance was provided in the implementation of an ongoing project on the development of national energy policies and strategic action plans covering 14 Pacific Islands

### **Access to energy services, electricity or cleaner fuels in rural areas increased**

In the area of energy and climate change, the focus was on poverty reduction and environmental sustainability. The three policy studies launched by the Regional Energy Programme for Poverty Reduction (REP-PoR) are being conducted by well-known institutes from the Asia Pacific region and expected to be completed by mid-2006. These three policy studies will: 1) analyse the impact of rising oil prices on the poor and the implications for the achievement of the MDGs; 2) analyse cross-border energy trade and its impact on the poor; and 3) undertake a regional mapping of options to promote private investments in alternative energy sources for the poor. In addition the Energy Team contributed to the development of the GEF Programming Toolkit on the Productive Uses of Renewable Energy, which is currently being finalised by UNDP/GEF.

Capacity development activities were formulated to support UNDP COs and host countries in the region to respond to multilateral conventions and energy access issues to meet MDGs. Policy advice and technical support were provided to Bangladesh, Cambodia and Pakistan to prepare medium-term country strategy papers on energy and climate change. Joint missions by the energy and environment team were conducted to prepare an E&E country programme framework for Afghanistan and a GEF country strategy framework for Indonesia. Technical support was also provided to Cambodia, Indonesia, Lao PDR, Mongolia, Philippines and Vietnam in the finalisation of country case studies and the design of project concept notes for rural energy services under the Global Village Energy Partnership (a UNDP and World Bank joint initiative). Energy-poverty and climate change workshops were organised collaboratively, benefiting 76 professionals – CO focal points and national counterparts from Cambodia, Indonesia, Lao PDR, Mongolia, Philippines, Vietnam, India, China, Malaysia, Pakistan, Maldives, Bangladesh, Iran and Thailand. Country-specific trainings were also provided to: 42 professionals in Mongolia on methodologies to identify development objectives supporting clean energy use, energy resource needs and technology assessment at national and sector levels; while 15 professionals in Timor-Leste were trained on methodologies to identify energy needs, resource and technology assessment at the community level including identification of villages for programme implementation. Other country level project development and policy advisory support is outlined in below table. Technical assistance was also provided per the table below to several countries in the performance of their GEF project implementation reviews. Moreover, several UNDP COs were assisted in the preparation of their second national communications proposal on Climate Change in compliance of host country commitments to the United Nations Framework Convention on Climate Change (UNFCCC).

The Community of Energy Sub-Practice in Asia-Pacific Region (CEPAP) has been instrumental in promoting the exchange of information and lessons learned in an effective way supporting the work of the REP-PoR, as well as in the development of three UNDP/GEF regional initiatives on: (1) Energy Standards and Labelling (Asia); (2) Energy Systems Optimisation (Asia); and, (3) GHG Abatement through Renewable Energy (the Pacific). The Gap analysis of the REP-PoR identifies country level gaps in institutional, policy, technology, capacity and access to knowledge and information limiting access to energy for the poor and has been completed in 15 Asian countries and 14 Pacific Island countries. The country reports are currently being summarised for publication. A synthesis report is also under preparation, drawing on key gaps that deter access to energy for the poor in the region. The Pacific Rapid Assessment and Gap Analysis report was finalized at the end of December followed by a Gender and Energy Add-on Report. This rapid assessment provides the baselines and a framework for programming of energy services provision for the poor at the country level in the Pacific.

The Energy component of the Energy and Environment Thematic Trust Fund (TTF) launched its fourth round funding globally in October 2005. The winners for the funding announced in December include Bhutan, Cambodia, China, Nepal and Timor-Leste. In this regard, technical support was provided for the design of project concept notes, coordination for the funding submission and the formulation of the project documents. The TTF funded projects are expected to start in February 2006.

### **Governments and local communities empowered to better manage biodiversity and the ecosystem services it provides**

Environmental management of the region's vast resources and rich biodiversity presents the greatest challenge, particularly when this responsibility needs to give priority to the

#### ***MDG7 and the Environment: New Strategies for an Old Problem***

Ecosystems and the services they provide are a cornerstone of development and poverty alleviation in the region. Most of these resources, be they fisheries in China or forests in Indonesia, are under threat.

The project and policy legs of UNDP have not always been in sync and, hence, the impacts have been sub-optimal. The pooling of resources at the RCB has allowed a move towards a more integrated and strategic approach. RCB is helping the China CO develop a ten-year Government-donor Partnership for conservation. As part of its knowledge management mandate, RCB has assessed the contributions of biodiversity to the MDGs, largely relying on cases from the treasure trove of the GEF programme portfolio and are translating them into policy recommendations.

**Result** – UNDP has long been a major channel for environmental funding in the Asia-Pacific. But by linking our programming to policy advice the RCB has helped steer the agenda and become an important player in environmental policy. The Partnership in China has attracted more than US\$75 million in funding to date. Importantly, more than a dozen Government line agencies and even more international partners are aligned around a common framework for conservation funding: an unprecedented achievement in China.

enhancement of livelihood opportunities and security of people living on the margins of poverty. Capacity development and technical assistance were given to China in the formulation of a national-level agricultural diversity conservation project, and to Bangladesh and Bhutan in the formulation of projects on agro-biodiversity conservation and eco-tourism. Similar assistance was given to India in GEF projects on medicinal plants, markets access, wetlands conservation and conservation of traditional rice varieties. Preparatory assistance was provided to Pakistan on forest conservation, as well as Samoa and tsunami-



affected Sri Lanka on the conservation of coastal forests. Fourteen countries received technical advisory support for the preparation of their 3<sup>rd</sup> National Reports to the UN Convention on Biological Diversity, as part of their commitment to the global convention. Lead support was provided in the assessment and preparation of the environmental damage chapter of WB/ADB/UNDP report and of UNDP India's Recovery Framework document, as well as a review of all other chapters.

Other technical assistance that was provided to COs includes: the preparation of protected area governance case studies for Cambodia and Malaysia and M&E support to Nepal, Philippines, Malaysia, Cambodia, Vietnam, Mongolia and China. In the second half of 2005, significant technical assistance was provided to 17 countries in the region in developing and submitting Project Implementation Reviews of on-going GEF-funded projects. These reviews highlighted the progress and impacts of UNDP's GEF-funded portfolio of conservation projects, and formed the basis for overall sub-regional project impact reports that summarised UNDP's contribution to GEF implementation in the region. Both within and outside UNDP, partnerships were forged and strengthened to enhance the impact of on-going and planned programme initiatives. Partnership discussions were held with a diverse array of organisations including sister multilateral agencies (the World Bank, UNEP and IFAD), international NGOs (IUCN, the Nature Conservancy, Wildlife Conservation Society, WWF and Conservation International) and regional institutions (Asian Disaster Preparedness Centre, RECOFTC and ASEAN Secretariat), while within the RCB, cross-practice links were developed with the Regional Indigenous Peoples Programme amongst others. Increasingly, RCB support in the areas of biodiversity and NRM focused on developing more programmatic and strategic portfolios for our clients. In Indonesia, a RCB team developed a GEF Strategy, and in India support was provided to streamlining the GEF biodiversity portfolio. In addition, lessons from UNDP biodiversity projects were distilled for a note on Biodiversity and MDGs, and an assessment of governance issues in protected areas.

### Capacity Development in the E&E Programme Area

The above-mentioned Regional Environmental Governance Programme case studies from five countries reveal strong demand for community capacity to engage and influence policy dialogue/debate around E&E issues. Pilot projects have been initiated to develop the capacity of the state to engage in environmental governance. The trans-boundary community dialogue initiative for the Lower Mekong River Basin Area reveals the primary importance of supporting links across country borders. Support has been provided to Philippines, Cambodia, Bhutan and China to formulate new programmes for capacity development based on the GEF-NCSAs and for GEF funding. Capacity 2015 has provided technical inputs in strengthening local government and community capacities for participating in environmental management and monitoring and addressing poverty concerns through effective natural resources management.

## Crisis Prevention & Recovery

### Strategic Objectives in 2005

1. Strengthen **capacities** for the development of **post-conflict recovery frameworks, reintegration programmes** and **conflict prevention and peace building**
2. Strengthen **disaster risk management and recovery capacity** at regional, national and local level
3. Strengthen **national mine action management** and technical **expertise**

#### **Strengthen capacities for the development of post-conflict recovery frameworks, reintegration programmes and conflict prevention and peace building**

Activities to meet this objective have been under the management of BCPR HQ working directly with COs. In the Pacific activities have been implemented through the Pacific Sub-Regional Centre in Suva (PRSC). In collaboration with PSRC, CPR advisers have been supporting the PNG CO to develop a comprehensive Crisis Prevention and Recovery Programme for BCPR funding.

#### **Strengthen disaster risk management and recovery capacity at regional, national and local levels**

Activities in support of the above objective to enhance disaster risk management and recovery capacity have been dominated by the Indian Ocean Tsunami Disaster, the Pakistan/Kashmir earthquake and avian influenza. While the entire UN system, in fact the entire world, has joined together in response to the tsunami disaster and in support of the tsunami affected countries, UNDP has taken a major role in tsunami recovery efforts. All of the RCB practice teams have contributed to these corporate efforts. Immediately following the tsunami disaster, the RCB formed a response team to coordinate the wide range of activities and share information to enhance the RCB support within the broader UNDP and UN System response to the tsunami disaster. The Crisis Prevention and Recovery (CPR) practice has played a major role in providing additional recovery capacity to UNDP COs. In turn, the COs are supporting the development of additional recovery capacity within the national and local governments in the affected countries.

The two CPR Regional Disaster Reduction Advisors (RDRA) for Asia were immediately assigned to two of the affected countries, with one deployed to Sri Lanka and the other supporting Thailand CO. The other affected countries were supported with Advisors sent from headquarters. All of the affected countries had immediate CPR surge capacity added to their operations within days of the event. The Advisors assisted the COs with technical backstopping of TRAC 1.1.3 emergency cash grants, the development of the flash appeal inputs for the COs, and also supported general situation reporting as well as advice on longer-term recovery programming. Most of the Delhi-based RDRA's work has focused on recovery support to capacity building for risk reduction the Tsunami affected countries (India, Sri Lanka and the Maldives). At the regulatory policy level, worthy of note is CPR support to Sri Lanka CO with the development of a Disaster Management Act, which was passed by the Government in May 2005. This support included policy dialogue and liaison with the relevant government counterparts and support in the drafting of the bill. In the last quarter of 2005 the CPR Adviser provided substantial inputs for a Sri Lanka Government Disaster Reduction Management Road Map as well as drafting support. As important is RDRA's support to Sri Lanka for the conceptualization and implementation of capacity building initiatives in DRM.

In the Maldives, CPR practice team has been providing TA for capacity building initiatives in DRM and support for the implementation of the CO DRM work plan. Moreover, CPR mobilized DRM experts to take forward the DRM agenda in the Maldives and, provided support for the development of disaster information systems and early warning systems and multi-hazard risk assessments. The RCB also conducted comparative research on engaging CSO's for Sri Lanka and provided short lists of recommended experts based on collated rosters of existing and new experts to assist with recovery planning, programming and implementation, with candidates provided to each country. In addition to the assistance provided directly to the tsunami-affected countries, the CPR team also actively engaged in International Early Warning System Development Workshops; participated in the World Bank-UNDP Joint Assessment Mission in India as well as in the joint OCHA/UNDG/UNDP Recovery Coordination Needs Assessment Mission to Sri Lanka, Maldives and Indonesia; and designed the UNDP Regional Capacity Building Programme for Tsunami Recovery.

Launched in October 2005, this Regional Capacity Building Programme will support further regional recovery and risk reduction efforts. The programme's main objectives are to help increase the capacity of countries affected by the Indian Ocean Tsunami to undertake post-disaster recovery, and to mitigate the risk that would ensue from any future natural disasters. To achieve these goals, the programme will focus on: improving information management systems for disaster and beneficiary tracking; helping improve Early Warning Systems and ensuring that notions of risk reduction are integrated into future recovery and development projects; as well as by offering opportunities for training and learning to national and regional natural disaster experts. Programme Team members have conducted several Country Office assessment Missions to affected countries (Sri Lanka, Maldives, India, Indonesia, Thailand). Following these missions, Country Offices have confirmed the relevance and timeliness of implementing the specific component activities. Work plan preparation for 2006 commenced in December 2005 and will be finalised in January 2006

**Enhancing Aid Transparency in the Tsunami Countries**

Days after the Tsunami struck, aid coordination shot to top of agenda for Governments struggling to coordinate hugely increased resources & actors.

At the ADB Conference in Manila in March 2005, UNDP offered technical assistance which included people and the Development Assistance Database (DAD) – proven in Afghanistan. The Response from Governments was an emphatic “yes”. Within 10 days, RCB fielded missions to Sri Lanka, Maldives, Thailand, and Aceh joined in August. Critical partnerships have benefiting from strong personal engagement of UN Special Envoy President Clinton – who signed 130 letters asking Ministers and NGO heads to back the DAD.

**Results** –RCB established and funded 4 world class systems to track Tsunami resources and results – each customised to meet national requirements. Mutual accountability of Governments to donors, and donors to governments has been enhanced. There is systematic downward accountability to affected communities (including access to gender disaggregated data). The DAD helps Government, donors, and citizens answer questions like: what are donors doing? Are there any results? Will it benefit me? How do we unblock bottlenecks?

Delhi based CPR RDRA also mobilized funds and provided conceptualization support to the CO for EWS initiatives in Tamil Nadu and provided a vital link between the Tsunami Regional Programme and the UN System Recovery initiatives in the Tsunami affected states. In Pakistan, Delhi-based CPR adviser and Team provided post earthquake coordination and early recovery support to UNDP Pakistan and are currently providing TA for the establishment of a

comprehensive DRM Programme, aimed at enhancing the capacities of both UNDP as well as national and local level government agencies.

In Iran, the CO and the government agreed on a 5-Year DRM Programme, which was officially signed in January 2006. BCPR Delhi provided conceptualization support for the Programme document. Support was provided to Bhutan with the implementation of two PAs – Urban Earthquake Vulnerability Risk and Integrated Disaster Reduction Management. Both these initiatives were supported financially, technically and to a certain extent operationally by CPR Team in Delhi. This has resulted in shifting UNDP Bhutan/Government policy thinking on the need for a DRM Road Map and a comprehensive DRM Capacity Building Programme.

***UN Inter-Agency Support for Avian and Human Pandemic Influenza Preparedness***

In response to an initiative of UN Resident Coordinators in Southeast Asia, the RCB initiated the formation of a small UN interagency Avian and Human Influenza Preparedness Team.

The team's missions to Vietnam, Cambodia, and Lao PDR have served to support the respective UNCT's efforts to raise the issue above the animal and human health sectors. Broad inter-ministerial coordination for avian influenza control and for pandemic influenza preparedness also leveraged UNDP's substantive experience with disaster management and governance.

**Results** – A better level of pandemic preparedness has been achieved regionally and globally. Governments have produced draft contingency plans, with donor backing. Inter-agency cooperation has improved regionally and at the country level with clear agreement on WHO and FAO in the technical lead; UNICEF providing strong Information/Education/Communications support; and UNDP providing disaster management expertise with OCHA supporting contingency planning efforts.

A unique opportunity for disaster risk reduction has engaged the CPR practice since June 2005. The rising awareness of the seriousness of Avian Influenza (AI) and the potential it creates for a catastrophic pandemic influenza to emerge has caused the UNCTs in Southeast Asia to organise sub-regional meetings on the topic. At the request of the RCs in the "frontline" avian influenza countries, an ad-hoc UN regional interagency team has been established to provide technical support to the national-level avian influenza and pandemic influenza preparedness efforts. The teams are lead technically by WHO on the human health and FAO on the animal health, with UNOCHA providing contingency planning expertise, UNDP providing risk reduction expertise and UNICEF

providing Information, Education and Communication (IEC) expertise as well as health sector programmatic expertise. The Bangkok-based Regional Disaster Reduction Advisor has facilitated the coordination of the team's activities and participated in three joint missions in support of Vietnam, Cambodia and Lao PDR. The effective role played by the CPR adviser in facilitating Inter-Agency Coordination, has led to the establishment of a new BCPR funded position - Regional Inter-Agency Coordinator on Avian and Human Influenza - reporting to the UN System Influenza Coordinator. Selected in December 2005, the AI Coordinator will commence duty in January 2006 and will work out of the regional UNOCHA office.

In addition to tsunami, earthquake and avian influenza pandemic preparedness efforts, the CPR Advisors supported broader disaster risk reduction efforts in the region. One of the major non-tsunami areas of activity was regional support for efforts at "mainstreaming" disaster risk reduction into development planning. An RDRA participated in an ECHO hosted Southeast Asia "Regional Consultative Meeting"; the Asian Disaster Preparedness Centre (ADPC) hosted the "First Meeting of the Advisory Panel for Mainstreaming Disaster Risk Management (MDRM) into Development"; and the "Fifth Meeting of the ADPC Regional Consultative Committee on Disaster Management (RCC5)", which focused on MDRM issues. The RDRAs developed relationships with newly established regional partners including UNOCHA and UNISDR

regional offices in Bangkok, and strengthened existing relationships with UNESCAP. Interaction with UNESCAP included attending a national level workshop in Vietnam as part of the CPR supported UNESCAP implemented project on Methodologies for Assessing the Socio-Economic Impacts of Disasters (tailoring the ECLAC methodology to Asia). Engagement with regional institutions has resulted in the production of two significant documents: (1) "Gender Dimensions in Disaster Management: A Guide for South Asia" produced in partnership with the Intermediate Technologies Development Group (ITDG); and, (2) a "Primer on Integrated Flood Risk Management in Asia" produced in partnership with the ADPC. The Advisors also provided direct technical advice to Iran, Sri Lanka, Bhutan and Indonesia COs for their programmes to support national and local capacity building for disaster risk management. In the case of Pakistan, the RCB support focused on practical advice on how to establish an effective and efficient aid coordination mechanism immediately after the devastating earthquake. Moreover, the Delhi-based Regional Disaster Reduction Advisor has been fully occupied with post-earthquake coordination and provision of early recovery support to UNDP Pakistan since October 2005.

### **Strengthen regional and national mine action management and technical expertise**

In order to address the effects of threats posed by landmines and unexploded ordnance to human safety, and to contribute to peace, confidence building and recovery and development activities, the Regional Mine Action Advisor (MAA) supported COs and country team efforts in strengthening national mine action capacities including policy development, planning, management and training. The MAA completed a major four-month intervention to establish a new mine action management and capacity building project to support the Government of Afghanistan assume responsibility for the current UN (DPKO) managed mine action programme. Concurrently, direct technical advice was also provided to Lebanon and Iran on their National Mine Action Programmes, with particular emphasis on enhancing national capacity to manage, coordinate and monitor mine action legislation, policy, and strategic planning. In addition, support was provided in a range of areas; including resource mobilisation, programme development, implementation and M&E. Support was also provided to a range of stakeholders including: COs, Government Mine Action Programmes, NGOs and other enterprises, enabling the countries to carry out mine action planning including establishing operational goals to reduce and eliminate landmines and other Explosive Remnants of War (ERW), in compliance with UN policy, the Ottawa and CCW Conventions. In the third and fourth quarters of 2005, continued mine action support was provided to programme transition in Afghanistan, with support to the newly recruited UNDP Capacity Development Advisor based in Kabul. Advisory and technical support was also provided to the Thai Ministry of Foreign Affairs and the Thailand Mine Action Centre. Both briefing and workshop support were provided to the global meeting of national Mine Action Directors and UN Advisors in Geneva on 19-24 September 2005. Direct support to the Mine Action Unit Team in New York middle management course conducted in Bangkok included presentations and administrative support to the 29 October post course workshop. Follow-up mission to Afghanistan was undertaken in mid December and concurrently commenced planning for a project reformulation mission to Iran for January 2006.



## Capacity Development in the CPR Programme Area

The work of the CPR area has been clearly oriented towards capacity development. In the tsunami emergency phase, the practice augmented technical capacity of COs and provided know-how in situation analysis, designing the flash appeal, and through the rosters of consultants. Medium-term focused activities addressed capacity needs of both sets of clients – COs and national counterparts. Tsunami-affected countries were provided explicit enhancement of capacities in aid tracking and monitoring; capacity development of the public service especially at the sub-national levels; capacity development for coordination of the recovery effort including reaching out to the private sector; and capacity for strengthening national and local oversight bodies. Capacity development services were provided in the area of new legislation and in strategic and recovery oriented planning. These have included recovery coordination needs assessments, compendia of tools & lessons learnt and support to effective early warning systems. The longer term oriented activities have been almost entirely focused on a more diverse set of stakeholders in the region and have resulted in initiatives to mainstream disaster risk reduction in planning. This is an important contribution as most countries in the region do not provide for disasters in their development strategies. Mine Action Management's support has been a combination of classical technical assistance and the vestment of longer-term capacities to support legislating, strategic planning, and policy development and capacity building through middle management training in countries requiring immediate attention.

## Management Practice

### Strategic Objectives in 2005

1. Management support and CO capacity assessment
2. Management advice on up-scaling of COs capacities and implementation modalities in light of the tsunami disaster and emergency response in the area of operations and field implementation
3. Strategic partnership building and resource mobilisation and advice for CO management
4. Direct advice, change management, training-learning advice and support in the following key management functional areas and their treatment in Atlas: (i) project management; (ii) human resources; (iii) resource management; (iv) procurement; and, (v) ICT (the latter involving staff from BOM's MSC (Atlas Help Desk), RIM Centre in Kuala Lumpur and OIST at NY HQ).

From early January 2005, the Management Practice Team (MPT) on mission status helped establish a "situation war room" for a multi-practice Tsunami Response Team (TRT) of the RCB. Reporting to the HQ Tsunami Task Force (TF), the MPT undertook CO capacity assessments to appraise CO staffing and funding requests, while advising and supporting management in identifying and rapidly deploying staffing resources and training teams to fill capacity gaps of the tsunami-affected COs. It also proposed re-prioritisation and simplifications in the RCB procedures and organisation of the pro-bono services of Deloitte & Touche to cope with increased workload in the RCB and four COs.

Other Outputs included: Increased programme delivery capacity support packages organised and deployed to the four priority COs:

Indonesia – on procurement quality;

- Maldives – on drastic up-scaling of a very small office and private sector partnerships (best practice top prize at RBAP Knowledge Fair);
- Sri Lanka – Atlas training, model and procedures resulting in six of eight sub-offices using Atlas with level of managers approving transactions; and,
- Thailand – re-orientation of staff capacities to new programming modalities, partnership arrangements (including the private sector and NGOs) and complex implementation arrangement requirements.

#### ***Maldives—Surge capacity to respond to crisis and recovery***

When the tsunami hit, UNDP/Maldives faced the challenge of responding to the catastrophe while possessing an existing capacity for an annual delivery of only USD 1.3 m as well as constraining ICT connectivity in the multi-island country.

In response to the CO's request for support, RCB put together a SWAT team that, working with numerous other UNDP actors and other partners, including the pro-bono contribution from Deloitte and Touche, managed to rapidly produce needed operational capacity despite a limited local skills market.

**Results** –A credible well-managed programme has been built that now sustains a \$20-\$30M annual delivery. A hard won improvement in connectivity has also benefited UN organisations working in the Maldives.

In order to strengthen management practice functions in other COs and Regional Centres based on demand, plans were elaborated during the April 2005 RR/DRR and Knowledge Fair

for conducting integrated CO capacity building based on the “Toolkit for Managing Change and professionalisation” in project management and other management sub-practices  
Outputs during the year included:

(a) Improvement oriented CO Action Plans developed and were resource persons at Myanmar sub-regional learning event of ASEAN “late-comers” (Mekong Plus) group of five COs: Myanmar, Vietnam, Lao PDR, Cambodia and Mongolia. Later followed by a mission to Bhutan.

(b) Learning launched for PRINCE2, and draft Results Management Guide self-study course leading to project management certification. Led by participants of the above six COs plus Thailand.

A mission to Samoa and Fiji Multi-country offices took place in August 2005 with the participation of staff from the Solomon Islands sub-office and the Pacific Sub-Regional Centre (PSRC) Manager. Papua New Guinea was postponed to 2006 at RC/RR request. The MPT 2005 Work plan Outputs addressed by this Pacific sub-region engagement mission included office delivery capacity increased through better understanding of how to:

1. use the Toolkit for Managing Change (TMC) to simplify business processes/work flows;
2. increase the quality of programme delivery and reduce risk by professionalisation and Certification initiatives such as PRINCE 2™ and the Results Management Guide;
3. support new business processes with Atlas; and,
4. strengthen capacities through “twinning arrangements” and exchanges.

Vietnam CO’s “PRINCE2 Pilot Follow up” Project received assistance for an in-depth Workflow and Practice Review and Recommendations for Change based on the new standards. The report was subsequently made available in “generic” form for use by other UNDP COs. It included the content from the Workshop for Project Management Support Consultants (PMSC) held in December at HQ.

The RCB-MPT’s real-time Atlas Tsunami Central Tree afforded managers a user friendly automated Executive Snapshot Report. Advocacy and advice to HQs helped assure HQ priority for Tsunami reporting, resulting in: (i) a new project at HQ to transfer Atlas data to the Development Assistance Database (DAD) system which the MPT had supported for the system to become corporate; (ii) a decision and TORs for the additional Tsunami financial analysis capability established at RBAP HQs; and, (iii) contributions to leveraging the pro-bono services of Deloitte & Touche, including address of strategic programming and implementation issues and Atlas support. This included: adding Thailand and, by extension, RCB, to the 3 priority Tsunami COs; the development of CO Business Process Maps using the Toolkit for Managing Change (TMC); and project management related query reports from Atlas. The MPT also assisted the RCB Communications Advisor to obtain information useful for reporting on 12 months of tsunami-related work, including response to inquiries from the media.

With the South Asia Earthquake, the MPT responded promptly to Pakistan with urgent support that included advice on implementation arrangements for emergency procurement of tents by other entities, on management of cash accounts and special project banking arrangements, and on UNV policies and procedures. Policy Advice and draft Guidelines and contributions Notes were provided to the following HQ units: BDP, various BOM units, BRSP, RBAP, and DGO. The topics covered included parts of the new Prescriptive Content/Guidelines, such as Programming and Implementation Arrangements. The RCB-MPT has assumed a lead role in supporting UN Reform simplification and harmonisation initiatives, in particular in serving as

RBAP focal point for the UNDG initiative “Harmonised Arrangements for Cash Transfer to Implementing Partners (HACT)”.

In November 2005, with the arrival of the MPT leader, efforts resumed to form a full MPT at the RCB.

## Information and Communication Technology for Development

### Strategic Objectives in 2005

1. Raise awareness and promote regional and national **policy dialogue and development** of policies and strategies focused on ICTs for poverty alleviation and the creation of an enabling environment.
2. Promote knowledge networks through a mix of **ICTs for better access** and sharing of tools, technologies, and information.
3. Support development of **locally relevant content, awareness and advocacy initiatives, and promote knowledge management** to facilitate greater e-services.

### Study best practices related to e-Governance initiatives and access to information policies when making ICT work for the poor

The Asia Pacific Development Information Programme (APDIP) ([www.adip.net](http://www.adip.net)) continues to deliver on its objectives through activities that involve awareness raising and advocacy, promoting ICT for development (ICT4D) policies and dialogue, building capacities, research, knowledge sharing and networking. APDIP relocated from its office in Kuala Lumpur, Malaysia to the RCB in late April 2005. Apart from completing pre-determined and 'self-standing' programme activities developed for 2005, APDIP also actively initiated activities in collaboration with other practice areas from both RCB (Governance) and RCC (HIV/ AIDS and Gender). Dedicated practice area focal points were also appointed in APDIP to help the various practice teams in the RCB and RCC to further mainstream ICT4D components within their respective practice areas. Five key areas for APDIP have been on a) e-Government and e-Governance; b) ICT and Poverty Alleviation; c) Free and Open Source Software Alternatives for Development; d) Internet Governance; and e) Gender Dimensions of the Information Society. The following highlights some of the achievements of APDIP in 2005.

The APDIP also continues to manage the one-stop shop and reference point of ICT4D Resources and key regional and national e-Government/ e-Governance related data, programmes, best practices and resources specific to the Asia-Pacific region.

#### Policy Development and Dialogue

APDIP aims to raise the awareness of ICT4D through promoting policy options; providing technical advisory services aimed at building capacities in the formulation and implementation of policies; and supporting efforts to share knowledge and lessons-learned through APDIP organised events, policy advice and publications. In total, an estimated 1,790 policy-makers and senior management from governments, CSOs, and national and media institutions participated in 25 events that the APDIP organised in 2005. Five thematic examples of major regional/ global events organised by APDIP in 2005 to engage senior policy-makers were:

#### ICT For Development

On the occasion of the World Summit on the Information Society (WSIS), held in Tunis, APDIP promoted UNDP's ICT4D initiatives in the Asia-Pacific region through the organization of and participation in a wide range of events and an exhibition at the UNDP "Sharing the Future " Pavilion. In addition, APDIP organized and co-organized a number of parallel events, most notably related to Free/Open Source Software, Internet governance, and ICT for poverty alleviation.

## Free and Open Source Software Alternatives for Development

In partnership with the Cambodian Government the 2nd Free and Open Source Software (FOSS) consultation was held in Siem Reap, Cambodia where more than 111 *Free and Open Source Software* policy makers and practitioners from 20 Asia-Pacific countries participated in a regional consultation on the way forward to further enhance the documentation, advocacy, and capacity building initiatives on FOSS in the region. The event was inaugurated by the Deputy Prime Minister of Cambodia.

## Internet Governance

Continuing its work on Internet governance, through the Open Regional Dialogue initiative, (ORDIG) APDIP provided substantial input to the UN Working Group on Internet Governance (WGIG). APDIP's input culminated in a paper submitted to WGIG for its deliberation and final report to the UN Secretary-General. The paper was the result and conclusion of a year-long process that included consultations in partnership with UNESCAP and others; a region-wide,

multilingual survey, issue-based research, and online consultation. A number of notable outputs stemmed from the ORDIG initiatives, including a regional declaration – the Tehran Declaration, endorsed by governments from around the region; a multi-media training toolkit for policy- and decision-makers; country specific reports; research papers; and a primer aimed at raising awareness on the issues.

## Access to ICTs

APDIP provides expert advisory services and technical advisory assistance to promote equity, especially in terms of gender balance in information flows and public access to information, focussing on the poor and marginalized; support local innovation on appropriate tools; and share 'best practices' via APDIP organised events; grants; on-the ground innovative projects; and publications.

### a) Research and Development on Innovative Technologies

APDIP continues to support a multi-stakeholder ICT Research and Development grant Initiative - with an aim to promote R&D of innovative technologies and ICT4D projects within the region. In 2005, 16 projects were initiated and funded.

### b) Free and Open Source Software Alternatives for Development

APDIP also via its *International Open Source Network* (IOSN) initiative continues to promote the FOSS alternative for developing countries, through the provision of tools for localisation,

### **Largest co-ordinated HIV/AIDS media campaign In Asia-Pacific**

The region now has one of the fastest HIV infection rates in the world, with Asia having the second largest number of people living with HIV/AIDS, estimated at as many as 8 million. In spite of this, the sheer lack of visibility of HIV/ AIDS issues in the mainstream media remains a huge challenge.

The ICT4D team (RCB) and the HIV/AIDS team (RCC) initiated a massive HIV/AIDS campaign with 6 partners (encompassing UN agencies, UNDP COs, INGO and private sector), and 12 participating national broadcast partners. The total investment is USD 1.7 million, with RCB's ICT4D programme's catalyst contribution at USD 40,000. National broadcasters from 12 countries were brought together to learn from previous HIV/AIDS-related productions, and to assist them to develop scripts of the most appropriate messages for their individual countries.

**Results** –12 unique stories were aired on 1 December 2005 in conjunction with World Aids Day to an estimated 500 million viewers, with the broadcast also being distributed free in the region to national broadcasters and to CSOs for use in advocacy workshops. All partners have committed to promoting the content in major international and regional HIV/AIDS conferences in 2006. Requests have been received from Africa and Europe for the re-broadcast of the content.

information dissemination, capacity building initiatives. These include a pilot training of trainers' project; and a small grants programme in the Pacific Islands.

**Programmatic support for UNDP Country Offices in Asia-Pacific, UN Agencies; UNDP Global; Governments and Civil Society Organisations from other regions.**

APDIP provides advisory services for COs in programmatic ICT areas such as overall programme development and project document and proposal reviews. In addition, the team continues to serve as a general conduit for COs to link to resources and experts within the APDIP network.. The team manages the network of UNDP ICT Programme Officers/Focal Points in Asia-Pacific to address various programmatic issues relating to mainstreaming ICT for development, UNDP corporate framework on ICT for development, and topical ICT for development trends. APDIP also actively provided technical back-stopping and policy advice to UNDP COs; sister UN agencies; governments; and civil society organisations in other regions (Latin America and Africa). In addition, the team advised the UN systems on the development of new FOSS based website and back-end systems as well as provided consultations to the UN Joint Inspection Unit (JIU) on APDIP's Open Source projects, case studies and use for JIU to prepare the Unit's report on the Policies of United Nations System Organisations toward the Use of Open Source Software.

**Regional Linkages and Synergies**

APDIP has also partnered with UNESCAP, UNIFEM, UNICEF, ITU, UNAIDS, UNCRD and UNESCO in initiating, supporting and collaborating on regional ICT4D issues. APDIP continues to work with regional professionals and CSOs for research and content development activities, fielding missions and facilitating a variety of workshops and seminar activities. The team also partnered with several key regional CSOs to build their capacities to engage policy-makers on debating the larger issues of development with cross links to issues related to the MDGs and sustainable human development

## South-South Cooperation

### Strategic Objectives in 2005

1. Assist affected countries in their post-tsunami recovery efforts,
2. Promote the use of Southern resources and ideas to complement North-South development.
3. Work with other UN Agencies as a knowledge resource on South-South Cooperation.

The Asian tsunami highlighted the need for a concerted effort to address the needs in the field of disaster risk reduction. The Special Unit for South-South Cooperation (SU-SSC) deemed it important to assist in strengthening the RCB's support to tsunami-affected countries by providing expertise from the South to the tsunami-affected countries in conceptualising and implementing immediate recovery projects. In Thailand, the advisory assistance of the SSC team led to the following projects being implemented in collaboration with Thai NGOs "Livelihood Restoration of Fishery Communities in Affected Coastal Villages in Phang Nga Bay and Ranong Province (covering some parts of Phuket)"; "Livelihood and Ecology Restoration in Nine Tsunami-affected Sub-districts in Phang Nga Province"; and, "Indigenous Livelihood Restoration and Sustainable Ecology for Lanta Islands."

In Indonesia, the South-South resources supported the recruitment of a Technical Advisor on Disaster Risk Management based in Aceh. Some of the significant results achieved include development of a regulatory mechanism for the Indonesian Bureau of Recovery and Reconstruction for quality of design for construction resistant to natural hazards; planning a centre of excellence at Syiah University for demonstration of the design of buildings that will withstand tsunami and earthquakes; assessment of building plans for government, UNDP and UN habitat as well as assessment of 10 proposals in "Developing Community based Risk Reduction in Aceh and West Sumatra Provinces". The lack of international organizations and development agencies based in the Maldives prior to the tsunami meant that experienced staff in disaster risk management and recovery was virtually non-existent. The arrival of too many organisations at once made the situation worse. The South-South resources therefore supported national, regional and southern staff in the areas of shelter, helping affected families in 58 islands repair or reconstruct their houses. The resources were also used to support the rehabilitation of infrastructure, especially harbours destroyed by the tsunami. Lastly, South-South resources were provided for implementation support. The team assembled was responsible for procurement, financial management and

#### ***How South-South Cooperation Complements Disaster Response and Risk Management***

Developing countries are unfortunately more vulnerable to disasters, yet often have important experience to share about how to reduce risk and how to cope. Local communities are first to suffer, but also the first to respond to disasters before any outside help arrives. South-South exchanges have leveraged existing knowledge and experiences to minimise vulnerability to hazards and better respond to crisis.

In the aftermath of the Tsunami, the RCB tsunami response team identified critical positions to be supported in country offices, and 22 southern experts were deployed to Indonesia, Maldives, Sri Lanka and Thailand to help country offices programme resources and implement projects. The RCB engaged southern consultants to conduct training sessions for the private sector and government in Sri Lanka.

**Results** – CO capacity was strengthened with targeted southern experts, and communities response and preparedness for natural disasters was enhanced.

other related services to ensure the UNDP office coped with sudden increase in resources from \$1.5 million to \$30 million for 2005.

In the aftermath of the tsunami, UNDP and the other UN agencies took a lead role in housing construction, livelihood restoration, capacity building of community-based organisations and environmental issues. The demands of the recovery programme placed a burden on the UNDP country office. The South-South resources were used to fund a number of posts critical to the design and implementation of projects under the tsunami recovery programme. Some of the key achievements include UNDP taking a lead role in the establishment of the Government's Disaster Management Centre; organising of people's consultations on disaster management, with over 1100 meetings conducted; providing technical assessments on flash appeal projects; and preparing proposals for regeneration of damaged coastal ecosystems. In Sri Lanka, South-South resources were also used to train UN and Government representatives on alternative disaster damage assessment methods. Public and private sector representatives were trained in disaster risk management.

In partnership with BRSP, South-South resources were used to provide Private sector partnership advisory services at the Regional Centre in Bangkok and the COs in Indonesia and Sri Lanka. The results of this work are documented under the Private sector Partnerships section. The SSC Unit works with other partners to advance the Hyogo Framework of Action (HFA) formulated by the World Conference for Disaster Reduction in January 2005. The Unit developed the preparatory assistance phase of a Global Facility that will address disaster risk management at community level. In this area, the team has:

- Visited selected communities and consulted the local governments in the Philippines and China to study their pioneering approach in community based environmental monitoring and preparedness. A community awareness and preparedness workshop was held in the Philippines in which 52 representatives from eight regions shared lessons learnt;
- Cooperated with the Philippines CO to identify specific projects that will enhance current initiative in the three municipalities of Quezon Province, which was devastated by landslides.
- Participated in planning activities organised by the United Nations Disaster Management Training Programme (UNDMTP) to contribute to the Hyogo Framework of Action;
- Participated in the discussion on the evaluation of national and local capacity building in the tsunami-affected countries as input to the Tsunami Evaluation Coalition, initiated by the Active Learning Network on Accountability and Performance in cooperation with OCHA;
- Helped organise a pre-feasibility study on Asia-Africa Development University Network that commenced in July 2005. The study was conducted in Thailand, Indonesia and Lao PDR; and,
- Assisted in the course on "Community Based Disaster Risk Management" by developing four lessons and acting as resource persons during the course. In October 2005, in partnership with the International Institute for Rural Reconstruction, the team conducted the First International Course on Facilitating Community Managed Disaster Risk Reduction".

The South-South Unit also responded to the request for support by other UN Agencies. The Unit provided advisory services during the design of a UNESCAP project on South-South Disaster Risk Management. During a regional workshop convened under the project, the South-South Unit provided facilitation for the meeting. The Unit also worked with UNEP during their deliberations on using South-South Cooperation as their platform for the implementation of the Bali Plan of Action on environment.

## Resource Mobilization and Strategic Partnerships

The UNDP Tsunami Task Force established its private sector sub-group and deployed private sector focal points to provide support in each UNDP Office of the four main Tsunami-affected countries. RCB is actively engaged also in the resource mobilization campaign for the Earthquake recovery operation in South Asia, which is resulting in some cash donations from Japanese private companies.

RCB served as a regional focal point for private sector partnerships, providing operational and technical assistance to the COs in Thailand, Indonesia, Sri Lanka and Maldives, with close coordination with the Bureau of Resources and Strategic Partnerships (BRSP). Outreach activities were conducted utilising the new C.O.P.E. webpage (Cooperate Partnership for Emergency with UNDP) and a number of UNDP presentations and discussions with international chambers of commerce in Tsunami affected countries.

RCB teamed up with UNESCAP to hold the Asia Pacific Business Forum (Bangkok, 13-15 May 2005) by providing knowledge and expertise for its corporate social responsibility sub-session. RCB worked with the Global Compact Office to share UNDP’s private sector partnership programme at the UN System Wide Workshop for Business Partnership (Geneva, 26-27 May).

Mission advisory services of the MPT also targeted strategic partnership building and resource mobilisation. The Private Sector Initiative was carried out for three tsunami-affected countries: Indonesia, Sri Lanka and Maldives. Other programmes, such as the Lao land mine action

programme, were also a beneficiary of this service. The knowledge and experiences gathered from these partnerships were highlighted in the Management Practice workshop for the Mekong Sub-region Country Office Workshop (Yangon, 20-23 June) as key learning resources. In addition, the India, Nepal, Sri Lanka, Maldives, Thailand and Pakistan COs attended the workshop for the Private Public Partnership which was organized in collaboration with BRSP (Bangkok 17 – 18 November)

### **UNDP and Microsoft Partnering in Knowledge Management**

A unique partnership between UNDP and Microsoft is being explored with the aim to build a state-of-the-art knowledge sharing portal to assist the RCB and its clients to advance UNDP's goal of becoming a genuine learning and knowledge based organisation.

## Communications

### Tsunami News Network

The beginning and end of 2005 centred largely on tsunami outreach activities. The first three months of 2005 were committed to staffing skilled Communications Officers on the ground in the tsunami-affected countries. Direct referrals from the Communications Advisor were hired in Aceh and Bangkok and on a revolving basis in Colombo and Male. An additional staff member was added to the Communications office in the Regional Centre to support tsunami outreach. With the team in place, a UNDP Tsunami News Network was launched. For one month, UNDP had a story each day from at least one of the tsunami countries. Press calls were fielded around the clock. The result of the team effort is that hundreds of news reports included UNDP aspects of the tsunami relief and coordination efforts – highlights included CNN, International Herald Tribune, Newsweek, Guardian, Washington Post, BBC TV, Wall St. Journal to name but a few.

The team also helped with the media outreach for the Manila donor conference organised by the ADB, and the visits to the tsunami-affected countries of UN Deputy Special Envoy and the Asia tour of the UN Special Envoy on the Tsunami.. Four support missions were fielded. The Communications team worked with UNDP Maldives on its adopt-an-island scheme. A documentary filmmaker, recommended by RCB, produced a Maldives film that ended up on BBC TV, the Lehrer News Hour. Adopt-an-Island live interviews were lined up with BBC World and CNBC. Features also ran in the Financial Times, the South China Morning Post and other media outlets.

During the immediate aftermath of the **8 October 2005 earthquake**, the Communications team identified international broadcasters and targeted print media to line up live international broadcast interviews with the UN Resident Coordinator and provided regular updated contact lists of reporters to UNDP Pakistan for their outreach in the country. At the end of the year, in the lead-up to the **tsunami one-year anniversary**, the Regional Communications Adviser provided on-the-ground support to UNDP Indonesia, generating news stories just prior to the commemoration which ran on major news wires. The RCB Communications team provided extensive promotional support to the Regional Aid Management team which resulted in coverage in the Economist, the Christian Science Monitor and other outlets. RCB Communications support to a UNDP Thailand television production on tsunami work with the sea gypsies was aired on the Lehrer News Hour and BBC.

### The Communications team also:

- Organised and facilitated **communications training**: a *three-day training workshop for 35 UNDP Communications staff from across the region*; a two-day communications training workshop for 14 UNDP governance focal points from across the region; and a *high-level communications training for 14 Resident Representatives and Deputy Resident Representatives* organised in collaboration with COA NY;
- Coached and provided feedback on **13 country offices' communications strategies**.
- A **regional communications strategy** was drafted;

- Provided **editing and messaging support** to the teams of the tsunami-affected countries, including support during the 17-day tsunami trip of the RBAP Regional Director and visit of the UN Special Envoy; UNDP Sri Lanka MDG Report press kit; UNDP China for press kit for 2005 National HDR, and op-ed on Tumen regional programme; UNDP Thailand for press kit and op-ed on MDG8; Cambodia CO on their Annual Report; Vietnam CO for an Op-ed on the meeting of the Vietnam Prime Minister and the US President, which ran in the LA times; and a letter-to-the Editor for the regional trafficking project and the opening of the Regional Centre;
- Organised **Asia regional press briefing on the Human Development Report**, wrote regional release and advised on regional outreach strategy;
- Provided advice and **regional outreach support and media contacts** to the RCC for the LDC Report on MDGs -- Facilitated LDC trade story in Herald Tribune; Outreach support for regional tsunami coverage; Regional outreach support for Global MDG Report from Jeffrey Sachs' Office
- Provided **international media outreach support** to UNDP China for its national Human Development Report, ending up on the pages of Newsweek and the Financial Times, with an editorial drafted in Bangkok which ran in the Straits Times; UNDP China for its Tumen River programme with an editorial drafted in Bangkok that ran in the South China Morning Post; UNDP Bangladesh for a conference on improving textile exports in the post-quota era; launch of the Thailand MDG8 report; launch of the Thailand Development Assistance Database (DAD) for tsunami tracking; advice provided on producers and approach to Thailand tsunami documentary for international broadcast;\*
- Vetted resumes for UNDP Afghanistan, UNDP Lao PDR, UNDP Nepal for their respective CO Communications team; Took part in hiring panels for inter-agency trafficking project; hiring panel for Regional Aid Management team

## Knowledge Management Events

An Asia-Pacific UNDP-internal **Knowledge Fair** was organised in Bangkok on 27-29 April 2005. The first event was a dynamic, people-to-people knowledge sharing gathering between some 220 UNDP colleagues, with 55 CO “good practices” exhibited and for sale as well as global and regional knowledge products on display. The Knowledge Fair was part of the broader region-wide meeting organised for UNDP Resident Representatives and Deputy Resident Representatives from Asia-Pacific’s 25 UNDP COs, thus complemented and enlivened the discussions. The Fair yielded a number of achievements as well as key lessons learned, some of which were:

- The Knowledge Fair was successful in creating a new demand for knowledge management, helped strengthen the Mutual Support Initiative and created a market place where COs are rewarded for sharing relevant knowledge;
- It was suggested that future cluster meetings could be shaped around this type of fair and around similar knowledge activities to stimulate real-time exchange of experiences and knowledge and the creation of mutually beneficial communities of practices; and,
- Practice presentations at the cluster meetings were reinforced by products and good practices displayed at the fair.

### **Knowledge sharing for development**

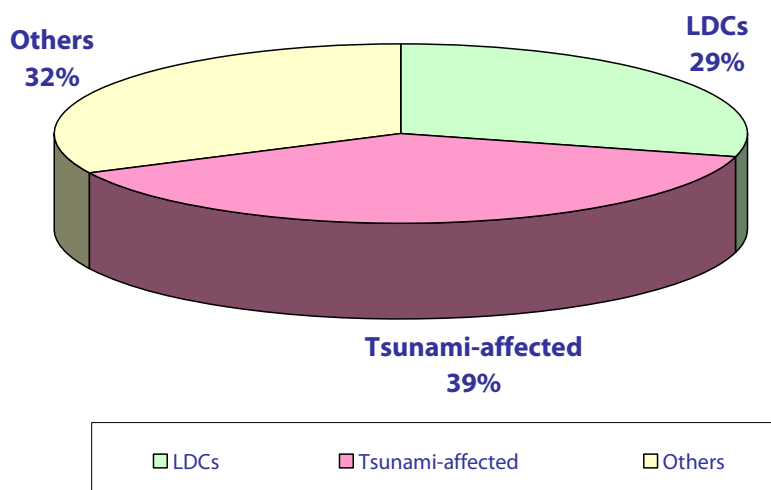
One of UNDP’s comparative advantages lies what we gain from experience. But the “knowledge premium” derives from sharing it. The RCB’s “regional advantage” allows us to translate country level experience into policy advice for use elsewhere, and it helps us to turn policy advice into options and programmes in countries and regionally.

In April, the first ever UNDP-internal Knowledge Fair was organised with RR/DRRs from the 25 Asia-Pacific COs. In addition to a wide display of publications and other resources, 57 country-level “good practices” were bought and sold in a people-to-people marketplace game. Awards were given to the best sellers as well as for best impact, ease of replication and best packaging.

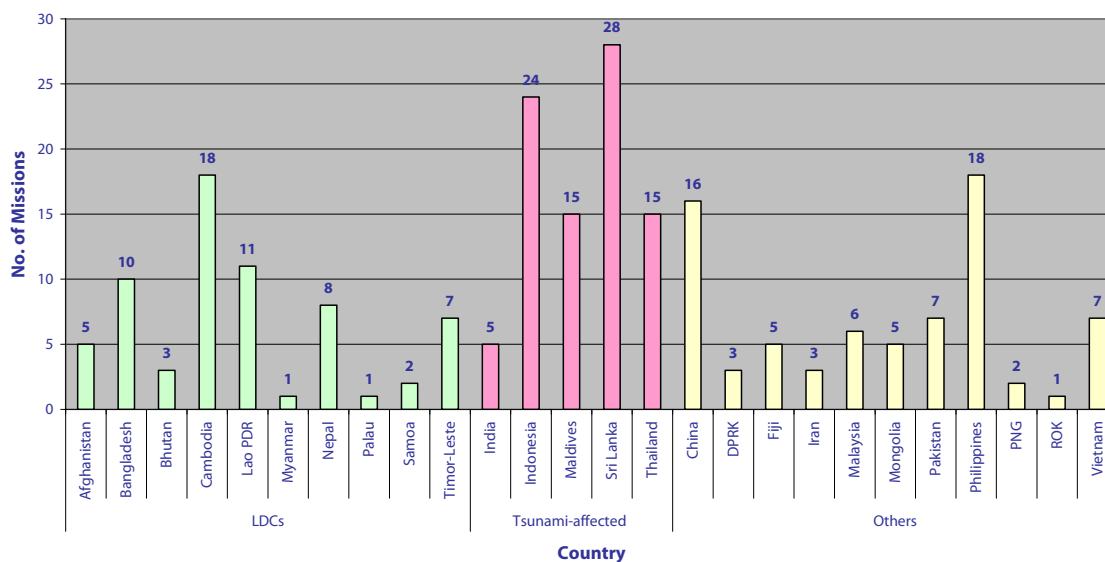
**Results** – Countries and colleagues were connected, and learned from each other. RR/DRRs put their “resource mobilisation” skills to the test. A number of the shared good practices are being replicated elsewhere. The Fair proved itself as a demonstration project on the value of Knowledge Fair, with discussions on county level knowledge fairs taking place within COs in Fiji, Bangladesh, China, Indonesia, Pakistan, Samoa, and Papua New Guinea.

The Knowledge Services Team tailored a one day partnership building and knowledge management workshop for 40 UNESCAP officials to demonstrate UNDP’s knowledge management experience and to facilitate UNESCAP’s own knowledge management strategy. The team also designed and facilitated a three-day sub-Regional Competency building Training Workshop in Hanoi for 20 national staff from Lao PDR, Myanmar, Cambodia and Vietnam in the areas of building and sharing knowledge and learning; UN core values; team building; and, task management. The team has been involved in supporting Knowledge Fairs in the Pacific (Samoa, Papua New Guinea and Fiji), and recently participated in and presented UNDP’s network experience at the annual Knowledge Management Asia 2005 conference. Furthermore, the team co-negotiated and attended an inter-regional workshop on Global KM Framework (Bangkok, Beirut, Bratislava, Colombo, Johannesburg, Panama and Headquarters).

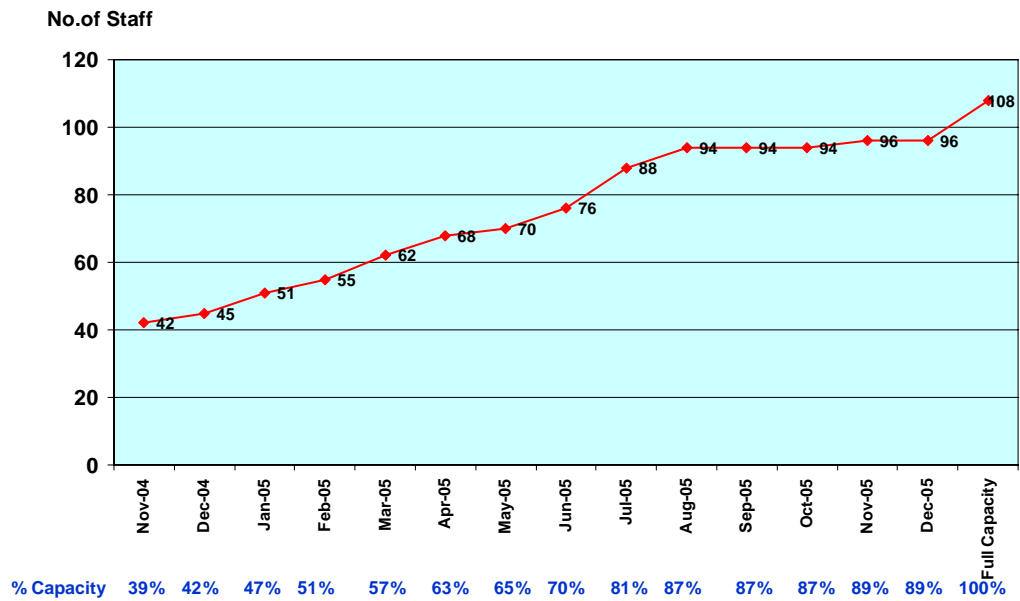

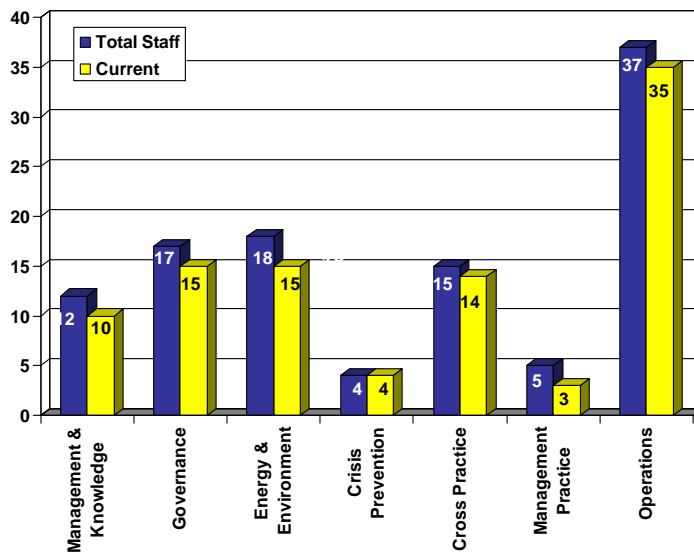

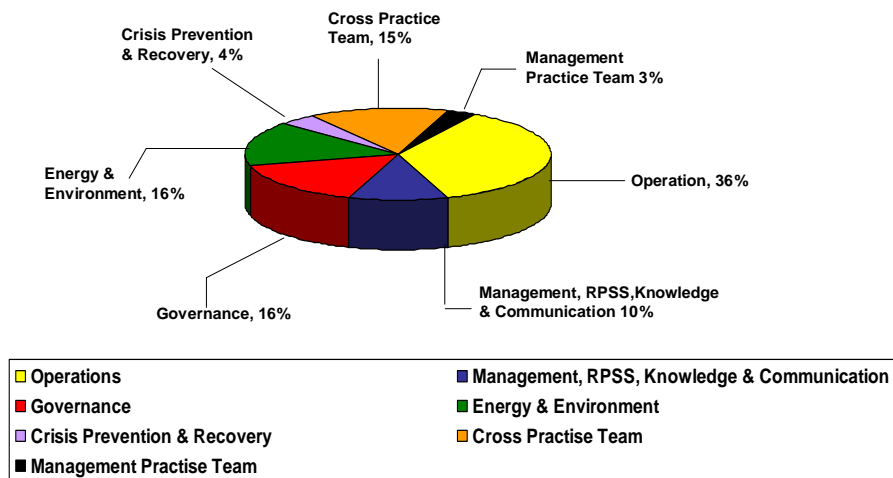
### Staff Build-up to Full Capacity

## Staff Distribution per Practice as of December 2005



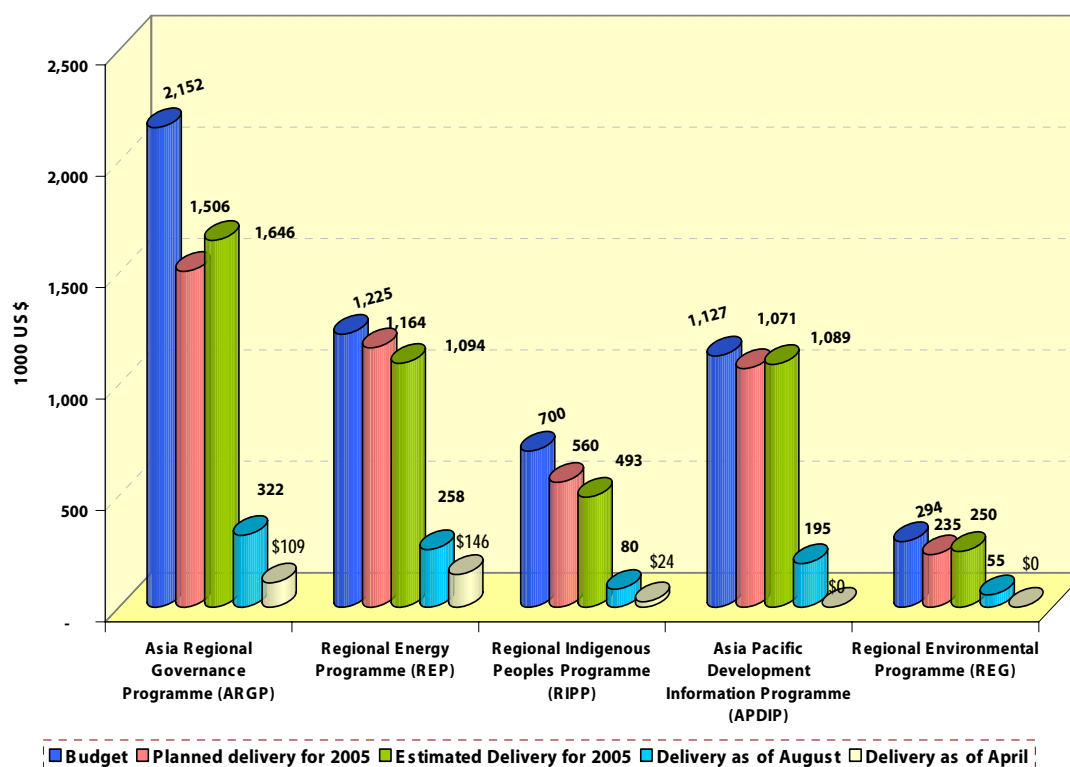

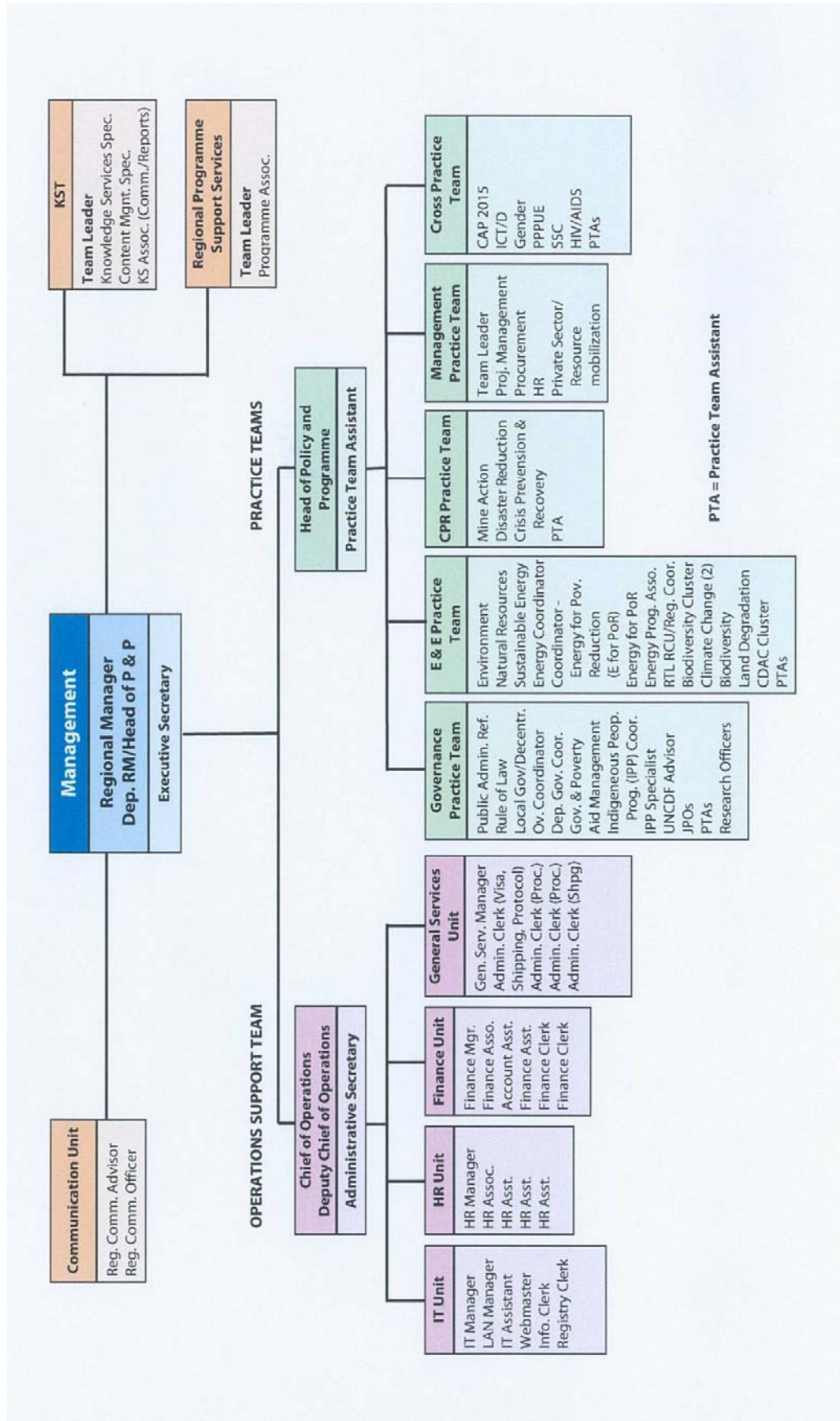

## Comparison of Projected vs. Estimated Delivery Status



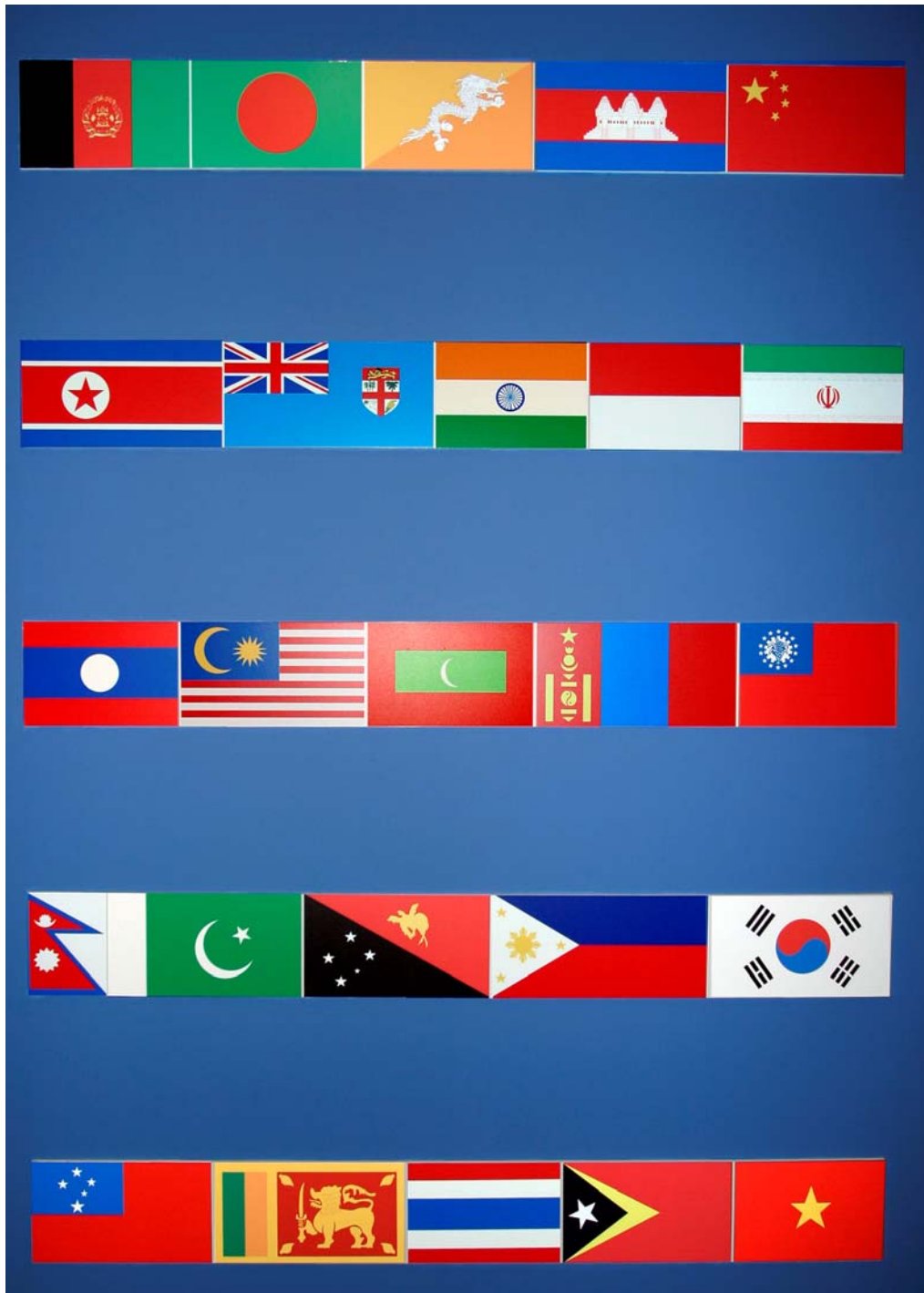
# Regional Centre in Bangkok – Organisational Structure











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
