#### <u>Ongoing Query</u>

#### > QUERY: Role of PRIs in improving the health and nutritional services at village level. **Experiences and Advice**

Most of the Central and State Government programmes are supposed to be implemented through panchayats at the village level. Since the upper castes are socially, culturally and economically powerful, they hold key positions in the village, which gives them the power to take decisions or influence the selection of beneficiaries under the government programmes. This prevents the selection of beneficiaries from SC and ST community for most of the beneficiary oriented schemes and also does not allow them from assessing the services, though most of the development programmes are meant for them.

Members of the decentralization community are requested to share their experience and examples on:

- What role can PRIs /Village Health, Sanitation & Nutrition Committees play in bridging the gap between the existing healthcare providers and the people in need of services particularly the excluded groups during Village Health, Sanitation & Nutrition (VHSN) days ?
- What are the parameters that need to be included while assessing the quality of the Health & Nutritional services of a village?
- What are the ways to assess/ investigate the access of services (Information, Physical, Financial and Social Capital) by the excluded community in a village

#### Closed Query

Drafting Public Interest Litigation for Effective Devolution of Powers to Panchayats. Advice and Examples

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Panchayats are meant to be autonomous institutions of self-government however they are treated as subordinate authorities at present. There is a wide variation in the devolution of powers to the panchayats across states. Further power, authority and responsibilities of Panchayats as envisaged in the Article 243G could not be exercised, as the State Governments were unable to empower them to collect taxes under Article 243H and Finance Commissions were formed under Article 243-I to initiate measures to improve financial position of Panchayats. Hence panchayats are not in a position to undertake the responsibilities in respect of items stated in Schedule XI of the Constitution. Also various Centrally Sponsored Schemes (CSS), which are under the purview of Panchayats, are being directly implemented in a mission mode approach. There is a need for reviewing CSS to enable State Governments to devolve power and functions to PRIs. Such review can be enforced through Public Interest Litigation (PIL) to the Supreme Court highlighting the above issues. Members are requested to comment and share their insights on:

- Whether it is necessary to seek time bound directions from Supreme Court to the State Governments to implement the 73<sup>rd</sup> Constitutional amendment?
- What are the administrative advantages /disadvantages of implementing CSS through Societies instead of departments of state governments or through Panchayats?
- How many states have constituted Finance Commissions under article 243I? Are the findings of the State Finance Commissions constituted so far, available in the public domain under article-4 of RTI Act?

#### 14th Finance Commission: Panchayats get Rs 2 lakh crore gift

The 14th Finance Commission has asked for assigning over Rs. 2 lakh crore between 2015 and 2020 to Panchayats to provide basic services. Finance Commission has recommended distribution of grants to states for local bodies using 2011 population data with weight of 90% and area with weight of 10%. The grants to States will be divided into two on the basis of rural and urban population, a grant to duly constituted Gram Panchayats and a grant to duly constituted Municipal bodies. **Read more here** 

**e-Panchayats programme to be launched in Nizamabad** The e-panchayat programme of Telangana government is going to be launched at Domakonda mandal headquarters village in Nizamabad district. It aims to provide citizen's services in villages. The programme will be initially extended to 150 mandals and later to rest of the state in a phased manner. These will also serve as one-stop shops for payments related not only to consumer services but also many taxes.

#### Bihar government advocates taxation powers to panchayats in the state

In order to strengthen panchayats in Bihar, state government advocate taxation powers to panchayats. It says that panchayats should get the right to impose taxes and also to distribute assistance money during accidents.

#### Five panchayats set to generate own electricity in Uttrakhand

Five panchayats in Purkul village in Dehradun will start groundwork for setting up a mini hydro-power plant of their own in the village. These panchayats have been picked up for an ambitious project of the Uttarakhand Renewable Energy Development Agency (UREDA). Under this, micro-mini hydro power plants will be set up in these villages. **Read more here** 

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#### UP orders social audit of 52,000 village panchayats

To ensure transparency and proper redressal of issues related to the functioning of government departments, the Uttar Pradesh government has ordered a social audit of all 52,000 village panchayats in the state. #### Government to expand service centres to 2.5 lakh panchayat

Under Digital India Program Government of India has decided to expand Common Service Centers from about 1.5 lakh at present to 2.5 lakh in rural areas. The Common Service Centers will provide public services to the rural community and are seen as an important vehicle for the progress of country including empowering women entrepreneurs, as more and more CSCs are being run by women across the country.

#### **Online tax payment in panchayats**

The Kerala State Government is going to introduce online collection of property tax at the gram panchayats from 1 April 2015. The certificates of births, deaths, and marriages registered from 1970 in local self-government institutions will also be issued online by the gram panchayats. Digitised documentation of the assets created in the annual Plan would be introduced to avoid duplication of identical schemes by different agencies and effective targeting of scarce budgetary funds.

#### Farm Markets in 800 Panchayats

Kerala State Government has taken a decision to start smaller outlets to sell and market farm produce in around 800 panchayats across the state. Through this, government aims to collect, process and distribute farm produces. To address the problems in hiring farm labour which had distanced people from farming, the government is going to start the 'Karshika Karma Sena'.

#### Audit of social sector schemes a must: CAG

Comptroller and Auditor General (CAG) emphasized on the need for mandatory social audit of social sector schemes to improve transparency and accountability. The expenditure of Central and State governments that directly impacts socio-economic development was estimated to be Rs. 17 lakh crore in 2013-2014, which means an average of Rs. 2,656 crore is incurred as 'development expenditure' per district. Focus is more on the vigilance by local bodies as large portion of above expenditure is being executed through panchayati raj institutions and urban local bodies. **Read more here** 

#### NDMC approves 3D mapping for smart city

Aimed at facilitating urban planning and ensuring better civic services, New Delhi Municipal Council will soon start three-dimensional mapping of its areas as part of its smart city project. The project will help in accurately identify our services, infrastructure and green areas. This information will be used while planning new development projects.

The article suggest that smart cities need a people-centric, proactive transport planning with public transport as the hub and non-motorized transport as spokes. It is high time we redefine public transport as the transport required by the public and not just publicly-funded transport. Development of efficient mass transport (transit) and promotion of non-motorized transport (NMT) modes, like walking and cycling, are widely suggested as solutions to improve the situation.

#### Making the "Make in India" Brand (by Nilanjan Banik for Market Express)

The article analyses the ecosystem and attributes that is required to make 'Make in India' brand effective. Pointing out to the Doing Business Report-2014, the World Bank placed India in the 134th position out of a sample of 189 countries, which is worse than China (96th), Sri Lanka (85th), Bangladesh (130th), or Pakistan (110th) when it comes to the convenience of doing business. The article suggests that to have world class infrastructure, government will require funding from the private sector.

#### How the Budget short-changed states' social security schemes

The 2015-16 budgets seem to have broken the contract between the Centre and the States on sharing the economic burden for delivering social security. The Centre's assistance to the states for social sector schemes has come down from a budgeted Rs 3.56 lakh crore in FY-2015 to Rs 2.20 lakh crore in FY-2016. The states will now have to use their funds to keep their social sector schemes going the way it is.

Approximately 3 out of every 10 Indians are internal migrants, yet it has been accorded very low priority in the existing policies. There is an urgent need to develop a dedicated system of institutions, legal frameworks and practices to support internal migration and protect migrants. ### **Europe's e-government opportunity** (an article by Julian Kirchherr, Julia Klier and Sebastian Stern)

The article analyses the potential of investing in e-government - the digital channels, apps, and websites that link citizens to the public sector. A McKinsey analysis suggests that capturing the full potential of government digitization could free up to \$1 trillion annually in economic value worldwide, through improved cost and operational performance. The article also suggests that investments in e-governance can produce equally important economic rewards as that can be reaped by traditional investments like roads, power grids, and other physical infrastructure.
