### **Ongoing Query**

Drafting Public Interest Litigation for Effective Devolution of Powers to Panchayats. Advice and Examples

Panchayats are meant to be autonomous institutions of self-government however they are treated as subordinate authorities at present. There is a wide variation in the devolution of powers to the panchayats across states. Further power, authority and responsibilities of Panchayats as envisaged in the Article 243G could not be exercised, as the State Governments were unable to empower them to

collect taxes under Article 243H and Finance Commissions were formed under Article 243-I to initiate measures to improve financial position of Panchayats. Hence panchayats are not in a position to undertake the responsibilities in respect of items stated in Schedule XI of the Constitution. Also various Centrally Sponsored Schemes (CSS), which are under the purview of Panchayats, are being directly implemented in a mission mode approach. There is a need for reviewing CSS to enable State Governments to devolve power and functions to PRIs. Such review can be enforced through Public Interest Litigation (PIL) to the Supreme Court highlighting the above issues. Members are requested to comment and share their insights on:

- Whether it is necessary to seek time bound directions from Supreme Court to the State Governments to implement the 73<sup>rd</sup> Constitutional amendment?
- What are the administrative advantages /disadvantages of implementing CSS through Societies instead of departments of state governments or through Panchayats?
- How many states have constituted Finance Commissions under article 243I? Are the findings
  of the State Finance Commissions constituted so far, available in the public domain under
  article-4 of RTI Act?

### Rajasthan government constitutes new gram panchayats and panchayat samitis

Rajasthan government has constituted 723 new Gram Panchayats and 47 new Panchayat Samities in the state. Another 1423 Gram Panchayats have been re-constituted in Rajasthan. The de-limitation of the panchayat bodies in the state has taken place after a gap of 20 years, as the last such exercise was undertaken in 1994.

# West Bengal gets Rs 20 Lakh World Bank grant per gram panchayat

Under the World Bank Project on Institutional Strengthening, 986 out of 999 gram panchayats of Bengal have qualified for award of block grant of around Rs.20 lakh each. The gram panchayats can use this award money as per their choice, for development of the villages.

### Half of state's budget to be given to panchayat bodies in Uttrakhand

The Uttrakhand's State Panchayati Raj Act is in final stages of drafting. Chief Minister has announced that once economic consolidation of disaster-hit is over, half of the state's budget will be allocated to panchayat bodies.

## Proposed amendment will give more powers to gram panchayats in Karnataka

The State government proposes to add more teeth and powers to the functioning of gram sabhas. A proposed amendment to the Karnataka Panchayat Raj Act intends to establish a new arm called Ward or Constituency Sabhas to lend a helping hand to gram panchayats to implement development programmes. After the amendment of the Act, gram panchayats will need to mandatorily consult gram sabhas before acquiring land for development projects or resettling or rehabilitating persons affected by the acquisition.

### Himachal Pradesh gets NOTA for panchayat by-polls

State Election Commission will introduce option of NOTA (None of the Above), when Himachal Pradesh goes to by-polls to fill 251 vacancies in the three-tier gram panchayats covering all 12 districts, including snow-bound Lahaul-Spiti district. Voters will now have the option to exercise NOTA for the first time in local polls. This will be north India's first state to get this option for the panchayat voters, after the May 9, 2014 Lok Sabha polls.

### No electronic voting machines for panchayat polls in Rajasthan

The state panel had requested ECI for introducing the EVMs in the panchayat elections due in January-February 2015 to fast-track the election process. However, the Election Commission of India (ECI) has turned down the state panel's demand for introducing EVMs for the first time in the panchayat elections; though the state panel will use the machines for the first time during the urban local bodies elections scheduled in November 2015.

# Panchayat in Coimbatore begins generating wealth from waste

The local body of Kurudampalayam village in the district has become the first in the district to utilise the surplus biogas through waste collected from the panchayat to set up a commercial food venture. Vallari women's self-help group collects the waste door-to-door twice a day in battery operated vehicles. The food outlet of the SGH sold its entire stock of 200 parcels of variety rice on the first day of its business. This panchayat has been selected for a Rs. 100-crore State-wide solid and resource management project.

# Delete 'obsolete' law in Panchayat Raj Act, says Bombay HC

The Maharashtra Village Panchayat Act of 1958 has provisions to disqualify any member of a Hindu Undivided Family for non-payment of taxes due from any other member of such joint family to contest election. The Bombay high court recently set aside the disqualification of a woman sarpanch, and declared a provision of a 1958 state law as 'obsolete' and discriminatory to women's rights in Panchayat Raj.

### **Education to be must for Rajasthan panchayat posts**

Uneducated public representatives and political leaders may soon be unable to contest panchayat elections in Rajasthan. In a first-of-its-kind initiative, the state's Ministry of Panchayati Raj has proposed that the government restrict uneducated leaders from contesting panchayat elections. According to the proposal, for a person to head the Panchayat Samiti (as Pradhan), he or she should have studied till Class 10, while for a Sarpanch, the limit is Class 8. For Panchayats in tribal areas, a Sarpanch must have studied till Class 5. The proposal has been sent for the approval of Chief Minister.

### **National Capability Building Framework-2014**

The National Capability Building Framework 2014 is meant to assist States in strengthening, expanding the outreach and enhancing the quality of their capability building initiatives for Panchayats. It provides numerous recommendations regarding training of large numbers, various modes of training, subjects of training, quality enhancing strategies, training of women as well as Scheduled Caste and Scheduled Tribe representatives, improving training institutions, etc. It is important that States follow these recommendations, and bring about systematic improvements in their capability building efforts for Panchayats.

**India at a turning point** (an article by Mr. Arun Maira, Former Member Planning Commission, Government of India)

The article says that India's Five-Year Plans are oriented towards budget-making rather than steering and are too rigid to respond to changes, as they occur. Therefore, such plans do not help leaders of governments to steer through a dynamic world. The article proposes 'Scenario Planning' as a better method of planning that enables steering through uncertainty. Under this, all strong forces that can cause change in a system like economic, environmental, social, and political forces are considered. **Read more here** 

# **Urbanisation in India: Challenges, Opportunities and the Way Forward** (An EPW article, Vol. - XLIX No. 42, October 18, 2014 by Shankar Acharya)

Analysing India's rapidly expanding process of urbanisation, the book identifies the key challenges and opportunities and proposes suitable managerial and policy reforms. It addresses critical issues and puts forth suggestions for better planning financing alternatives and, most importantly, better governance for improved service delivery and affordable housing. Divided thematically into three sections, the volume takes into account the important facets of urbanisation, the role of finance in urban development and methods to generate good governance in public institutions.

This article is a critique of poverty identification procedure recommended by the Rangarajan Committee on measurement of poverty. The contention in this note is that apart from some changes in matters of detail, the analytical basis of the identification methodology proposed in the report

displays loyalty to the flawed methodology of its distinguished predecessor committees and expert groups.

**What social-sector leaders need to succeed** (an article by Laura Callanan, Nora Gardner, Lenny Mendonca, and Doug Scott, McKinsey, November 2014)

This article shares the findings of a study done by McKinsey, where nearly 200 social-sector CEOs and other top managers of leading nonprofit organizations, foundations, social enterprises and impact-investing funds were surveyed. These leaders were asked to identify the critical attributes for leadership success in their sector and then to rate the performance of leaders in the field against each attribute. It was found that chronic underinvestment in leadership development is placing increasing demands on social-sector leaders and the sector's priorities are at risk, if the organizations lack leadership teams with the capabilities to fulfill emerging missions effectively and to adapt to fast-changing demands.
