

UN Volunteers train NSS Youth in Chennai

From June 22nd to June 28th 2009, two members of the UNV team in India, Mr Anoj Chhetri (Programme Officer) and Saoirse de Bont (UNV intern from Ireland), assisted as resource persons at the NSS Mega Summer Camp 2009 in the Rajiv Gandhi National Institute for Youth Development (RGNIYD) in Chennai. The summer camp was attended by over 400 NSS volunteers, representing states from across India.

Anoj and Saoirse conducted training on volunteerism for 6 consecutive days, thus addressing all 400 youths in the course of the camp. The training, which was carried out in conjunction with RGNIYD staff, covered topics such as 'what is volunteering'; UNV in India and overseas: the UNV business model: indicators: results Millennium Development Goals; how to volunteer; the sharing of personal experiences and stories; and the importance of teamwork. In addition, the latest UNV initiative 'STRIVE', which is based on the model of the Teach India campaign and is currently in its drafting stage, was presented.

The sessions were highly participatory and interactive, employing methods such as games, stories, film shows, role play, group discussion and presentations.
