

HEADWAY Programme

WHAT

Over 1.6 million people remain displaced in Iraq. They live mainly in the governorates of Erbil, Duhok, Sulaimaniyah and Ninewah, which are also home to over 253,600 Syrian refugees. Due to this influx and prolonged conflict, local resources and public services have been strained and economic opportunities dramatically compromised, thus impacting on the living conditions of host communities.

Against this background, the United Nations Development Programme (UNDP) and the UN Human Settlements Programme (UN-Habitat) launched the Headway programme in February 2019, with generous funding from the European Union's (EU) Regional Trust Fund, MADAD.

WHY

The Headway programme aims at strengthening the long-term resilience of governorates and populations largely affected by the crisis of refugees and internally displaced people seeking refuge and shelter in Iraq, with the objective of:



Enhancing the **capacities of subnational authorities** to effectively address the needs of target communities



Increasing the **responsiveness of service delivery** to advance social stability



Facilitating **local economic development** that will benefit the provision of safe public services and economic opportunities

How

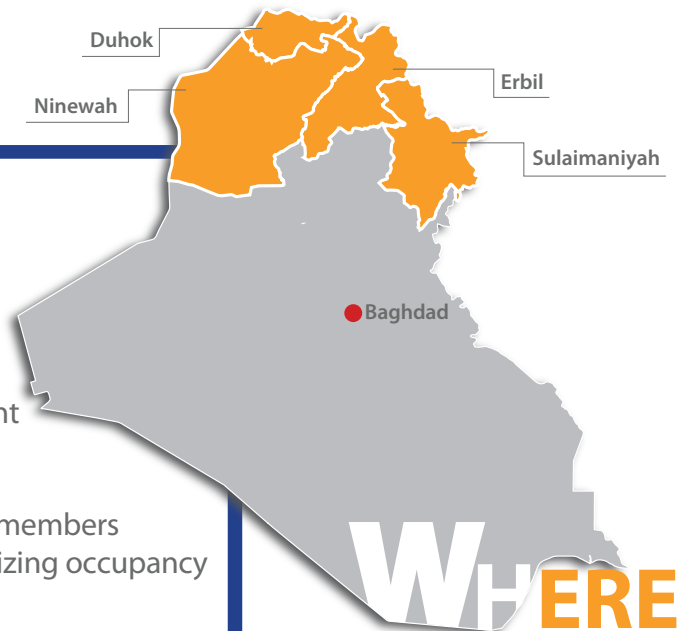
UNDP and UN-Habitat are jointly providing support via the following actions:

Conducting assessments to improve and update knowledge of vulnerabilities, damage and risks, and identifying sectors with potential for employment and local economic development

Rehabilitation of housing units and employment of members of target communities, where possible, while recognizing occupancy rights and providing societal evidence of land rights

Rehabilitation of small-scale community water, sanitation and hygiene infrastructure to improve the access of host communities, internally displaced people and refugees to basic municipal services and social, public, and economic infrastructure

Launching of a job creation grant scheme to finance intensive job-generating projects, in order to increase the self-reliance of vulnerable host communities, internally displaced people and refugees
