STORAGE EXPANDED

Over a 7 year period (2012 - 2019) UNDP has expanded water storage capacity by 2,261,927 gallons in Jamaica under the Global Environment Facility Small Grants
Programme (SGP) and the Japan Caribbean Climate Change Partnership (JCCCP).,




2.2 Million Gallons may be comparatively modest, but consider how many persons now have better access to water because of these modest investments - more than 135 000 persons from 128 communities







- (O) Construction of earth ponds;
- Black storage tanks linked to water collection conveyance systems and drip irrigation hoses,
- Aquaponics greenhouse and fish tanks to support sustainable livelihoods.
