#### Editorial

The ongoing war in Syria has taken its toll on Lebanon's peace and stability. The country hosts over 1.5 million refugees, together with the economic slowdown, has placed a huge strain on the limited resources and infrastructure of the country and services. Presence of refugees in poorer parts of Lebanon – such as Akkar and parts of Bekaa – exacerbated historical underdevelopment there. As a result, poverty, unemployment and social tensions between different communities are increasing while the country's socio-economic disparities are deepening.

There is a crucial need for both humanitarian and development actors to deliver support in a simultaneous way rather than a sequenced approach and as such addressing structural inequalities and reducing underlying risks, so that vulnerable communities can withstand future natural and human-induced crises even as they recover from them.

Furthermore, The Sustainable Development Goals (SDGs) affirm this call to action. They commit to help the very worst-off first, including 'refugees and internally displaced persons and migrants'. The SDGs encourage cooperation to 'strengthen the resilience of communities hosting refugees, particularly in developing countries'.

Through its different programs, UNDP aims for development during the time of crisis. Being the UN co-lead of the Lebanon Crisis Response Plan (LCRP) - a collective vision catering to the country's social, economic and environmental stability- UNDP is responsible to ensure that all aspects of the plan will contribute to Lebanon's long-term stability. With more than USD \$50 million delivered under the LCRP in 2016 alone, UNDP is at the forefront of efforts to support public institutions and host communities in Lebanon.

Another program is the Lebanon Host Communities Support Programme (LHSP). Since 2013, UNDP completed more than 460 projects in 120 localities and 42 Palestinian Gatherings throughout the country. It delivered services, improved livelihoods, and worked with communities to build a more stable future.

### Improving Access to Reliable Energy

Electricity is a foundation of vital social services. The onset of Syrian crisis is endangering the already weak and inefficient electricity systems, threatening Lebanon's social stability and economic development. The electricity demand of displaced Syrian amounts to 486 MW, a rough equivalent of one thermal power plant. Construction of new power plants is neither sufficient nor quick enough to tackle this urgent situation. How can we cover the rapidly increasing electricity demand while improving the resilience and sustainability of Lebanese systems? Taking the lead in this role, UNDP has identified key actions and undertaken a restoration of the electricity network. Read more...

### "Youth Employment Support" project

Through the Lebanon Host Communities Support Programme – LHSP, a wave of support began in 2013 targeting the vulnerable communities most affected by the crisis. As one of the donors supporting LHSP, the UK contributed to help implement several livelihood projects. "Youth Employment Support" project was a model intervention that supported 680 young men and women from all over Lebanon. The project provided vocational and technical training, as well as paid internship placements, giving the Lebanese youth the chance to gain first-hand experience, learn new skills, and meet employers and partners. # Garbage Crisis Brings forth Recycling in Kharayeb:

Municipality and Palestinian Popular Committees join hands to recycle almost two years after the eruption of the garbage crisis in Lebanon. Following six months of joint-efforts between Kharayeb Municipality, UNDP and local NGO PARD, over 2,400 families and enterprises are now engaged in sorting waste at-source in the town of Kharayeb and the four adjacent Palestinian Gatherings of Wasta, Jim Jim, Itanieh and Kfarbadda, thanks to the support of KFW, the Swiss Embassy and the People of Japan. # A chance for Lebanon to institutionalize social stability mechanisms

As a response to the impact of the Syrian crisis on Lebanon, the UNDP "Peace Building in Lebanon" project, funded by UKDFID, is building the capacities and skills of the staff of Social Development Centers of MoSA. Located at the local level in the Mechanisms for Social Stability model of UNDP, the trainings include skills of conflict analysis, negotiation and mediation.

116 area coordinators and SDC director from 55 centers all over Lebanon's governorates, have benefitted from the coaching and training sessions which focused on Conflict Mapping and Analysis and Mapping of Local Actors. UNDP designed the MSS to help local and municipal leaders in communities better manage their tensions. Read more...


### Regional Development Meetings at the Grand Serail Aim for direct Approval of urgently needed Development Projects.


