

EDITORIAL

Since 2005, the United Nations in Lebanon has been providing electoral assistance to the government. In 2012, the recent UNDP Lebanese Elections Assistance Project has focused its efforts towards the successful organization of free and fair parliamentary elections.

After five years of delay and three extensions of the mandate of the parliament, parliamentary elections were finally organized on May 6th, 2018. These elections were conducted under a new electoral law, which among other changes, included 15 electoral districts, and a proportional representation system with a preferential vote.

In terms of political participation, the 2018 parliamentary elections were characterized by a relatively low voter turnout of 49.7 percent nationally with "Beirut 1" registering the lowest (33.19 percent) and "Mount Lebanon 1" the highest turnout (67.09 percent). With an estimated number of more than a million voters who are not residing in the country, the turnout remained lower than in previous elections (52 percent in 2009).

For the first time, 82,970 Lebanese voters residing abroad, have casted their votes. Whilst out of country voting has remained modest, this new measure will pave the way for greater participation of registered voters living abroad.

These elections introduced important reforms, including the use of preprinted ballot, to ensure secrecy of voting, as well as out of country voting.

For the past six years, with the support of the European Union and more recently USAID, UNDP Electoral Assistance Project has been providing technical assistance to the Ministry of Interior and Municipalities on the organization of parliamentary elections. It has also supported the Supervisory Commission on Elections on the monitoring of media and campaign financing, as well as the Constitutional Council and the Shura Council on elections disputes.

The project also included the training of thousands of polling officials, the automation of candidates and a list of registration systems, the implementation of an automated result management system, the voters' education campaigns as well as the technical support to women's participation and representation.

Despite an increased level of electoral competitiveness with the total number of candidates jumping to 976, including 113 women candidates, women still, remain under represented. The increase of women candidates from 12 in 2009 to 86 (14.4%) in 2018, was not reflected in the number of seats won by women. The increase of women representation in parliament increased from 4 to 6 seats in 2018. This is a strong evidence that there is still a need to introduce special temporary measures, such as the quota, to increase women representation.

Another area that would require special attention in the years to come, is the safeguard of the rights to vote of people with disabilities, through accessible of polling stations.

Most importantly, the years to come should be an opportunity for the newly elected parliament to build trust with citizens, to ensure increased voters' participation and consolidation of democratic elections.

The UN will continue to support electoral reforms in Lebanon, which is strategically linked to the achievement of the Sustainable Development Goal no. 16 "Peace, Justice, and Strong Institutions" as well as to the Sustainable Development goals no. 5 on achieving Gender Equality. Both goals are key to achieve the 2030 Development Agenda in Lebanon.

The 2018 parliamentary elections were a step forward, and UNDP with the support of its partners, will assess the lessons learned from the 2018 elections, to develop the appropriate and most relevant priority areas of intervention towards achieving electoral reforms, democratic stability and participatory governance in Lebanon.

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UNDP LEAP SUPPORT TO THE 2018 PARLIAMENTARY ELECTIONS





On May 6th 2018, Lebanese citizens went to the polls to elect their new parliament for the first time since 2009, based on a new electoral proportional system. The national voter turnout reached 49.7% in the 15 electoral districts. Lebanese voters casted their votes using the preprinted ballot, a reform that was adopted to ensure voting secrecy and, hence, reduce vote-buying. The total number of candidates was 597, including 86 women candidates (14.4%), competing in 77 lists.

And for the first time, 82,970 registered Lebanese nationals residing abroad had the opportunity to exercise their right to vote. On April 27 and 29, turnout rate reached 59% for Lebanese expats voting in 40 foreign countries.

UNDP LEAP Assistance

Throughout the preparation of these historic elections, the United Nations Development Programme (UNDP), through the Lebanese Elections Assistance Project (LEAP), provided technical assistance and advisory support to the Ministry of Interior and Municipalities (MoIM) and the Supervisory Commission for Elections (SCE) to organize and conduct the required electoral processes according to international standards.

UNDPLEAP supported the MolMmainly in enhancing the elections' operations and management capacity by providing technical assistance in various electoral areas including training of polling officers and registration committees, automation of candidates and list registration systems, developing and implementing the result management system, establishing a hotline call center, procuring elections materials such as ballot boxes, and polling booths, designing and printing voter education materials and campaign, amongst others.

The project also supported SCE in the electoral monitoring and supervision activities through a monitoring system of the media and candidates'/ lists'campaigns as well as institutional strengthening of the Commission.

Furthermore, UNDP LEAP supported the Constitutional Council in enhancing its administrative capacities to facilitate their work during the post parliamentary elections period where the council is expecting to receive electoral challenges.

Under the framework of Voter Education, UNDP LEAP developed and produced several awareness campaigns targeting the public at large, women and youth, aiming at encouraging them to participate in elections.

UNDP LEAP also collaborated and partnered with UN agencies and UNDP projects, as well as civil society to enhance women's participation, as candidates and voters, in elections in an effective way.

In the same context, the project conducted several info sessions targeting women and youth across the country to provide them with information on the new electoral law.

Following the successful conduct of the parliamentary elections, the post elections period will focus on the lessons learned and on ways to approach the challenges faced, particularly those related to the accessibility of people with disabilities and women's participation in the political life.


AUTOMATION OF THE CANDIDATE REGISTRATION & RESULT MANAGEMENT SYSTEMS

ELECTRONIC RESULT MANAGEMENT SYSTEM

The United Nations Development Programme (UNDP), Lebanese Elections Assistance Project (LEAP) provided support to the Ministry of Interior and Municipalities (MolM) in developing a modern and reliable electronic electoral Results Management System (RMS).

The system includes the work process of the Registration Committees (RCs) and Higher Registration Committees (HRCs), development of the results calculation algorithm, and polling center's data import.

ENHANCING THE CAPACITY OF ELECTORAL OFFICIALS

Training the electoral officials and relevant stakeholders is an essential part of each election. Hence, the United Nations Development Programme (UNDP) - Lebanese Elections Assistance Project (LEAP), supported the Ministry of Interior and Municipalities (MoIM) in the development and conduct of electoral procedure trainings for polling officials.

UNDP LEAP training experts assisted the MoIM in developing and implementing a cascade training in order to build the capacity of polling officials on electoral procedures. From February to April 2018, 810 sessions were conducted nationwide, and over 15,000 polling officers were trained. This training played a significant role in ensuring that election procedures are implemented in accurate and consistent ways throughout every polling station nationwide.

1766 Call Center at the Service of the Public

The United Nations Development Programme (UNDP) - Lebanese Elections Assistance Project (LEAP) established and supported a call center at the premises of the Ministry of Interior and Municipalities (MoIM) to receive and answer calls from the Lebanese citizens: voters, candidates, polling staff; and to provide them with needed information.

UNDP LEAP recruited and trained a team of UN Volunteers to serve as hotline operators during the voter registration update and electoral periods.

On E-Day, the call center received and answered 7335 calls from polling officers: 85% were general enquiries and 15% reported on missing items. Read more...

Launching a Gender Roadmap
To increase Women's Participation in Elections

In preparation for the parliamentary elections, the Office of the Minister of State for Women's Affairs (OMSWA), in partnership with the United Nations Development Programme (UNDP) Lebanese Elections Assistance Project (LEAP), the European Union and the UN Women in Lebanon, launched a gender roadmap during the "Fostering the role of political parties to promote women's representation in the upcoming Parliamentary elections 2018" workshop on Wednesday 17th of January in Beirut.

Aiming to enhance the meaningful participation of women in elections, the joint roadmap presented alternatives, other than quota, to increase women's participation in politics and help in advocating and influencing public behaviour to support the inclusion of women in public life. Read more...

Eight info sessions were conducted from January 24th to March 2nd, before the closing of the candidate registration on March 7th, in different regions such as: Rayfoun, Sin El Fil, Chtaura, Tripoli, Saida, Zgharta, Baakline, and Beirut.

The overall objective of the awareness sessions was to increase young people's motivation and preparedness to participate constructively in elections. Read more...





The guide comprises a simplified reading of the Electoral Law 44/2017 and gives emphasis to information related to the voting system, voter's and candidate's eligibility, the documents needed to run for elections, lists registration, ballot papers and preferential vote.
