Launched in 2016, the Stabilization Facility for Libya (SFL) is a multi-donor initiative that provides light rehabilitation of basic services infrastructure; boosts government capacities and promotes engagement between the central government and municipalities; and supports local peace structures for conflict management. The SFL works closely with other United Nations Development Programme (UNDP) projects; United Nations agencies, funds and programmes; the United Nations Support Mission in Libya (UNSMIL); and other local and international partners to maximize its impact.

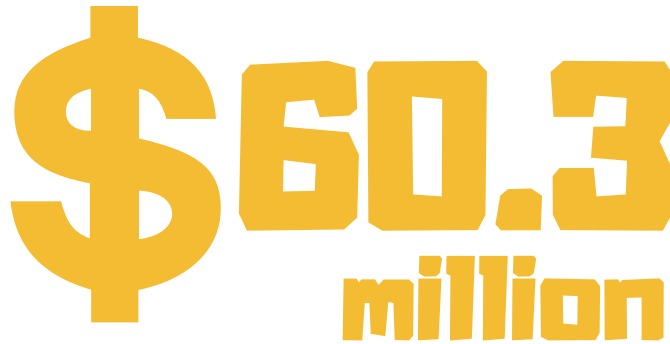

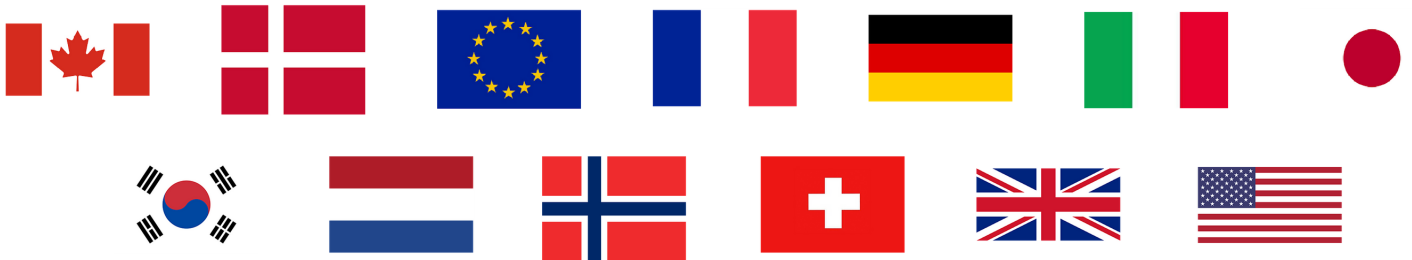

In an effort to strengthen the Facility, UNDP hired two independent consultants who reviewed the relevance and achievability of the strategic goals of the SFL and its operational performance. Based on their findings and recommendations, UNDP proposes that the next phase of the SFL should include:

- 1) Alignment with SRGS's Action Plan.** Considering changes in political dynamics since 2016, and the UN SRSG's Action Plan launched in September 2017, UNDP proposes that the SFL focus more on strengthening national unity for all Libyans and clearly identifying tailored stabilization objectives for each city where it works. The Facility will ensure that the local strategies flow from and are linked to the national goal of unifying state institutions to serve everyone in Libya.
- 2) An enhanced relationship with the Ministry of Planning (MoP).** The Facility will reinforce its relationship with the MoP, improving coordination and policy planning, under defined terms of reference.
- 3) New partnerships with Libyan public service delivery bodies.** The SFL will work to establish partnerships with Libyan national public service agencies (for example the General Companies) to support stabilization in local areas.
- 4) Deeper impact.** UNDP recommends that the Facility deepen its engagement in the places it works, strengthening conflict monitoring and management support, increasing capacity boost assistance, ensuring public facilities are fully restored, and linking these actions together.
- 5) Greater synergy with other activities.** UNDP will prioritize complementarity and partnership opportunities with other programs and activities, including, but not limited to, those efforts in place by UNSMIL, UN agencies, the EU Trust Fund and bilateral programs.
