BACKGROUND

The years of 2015 and 2017 witnessed large scale devastation in Nepal due to earthquakes and flood respectively, causing adverse impact on life, livelihoods and infrastructures. The vulnerable and marginalized people in rural areas, who were already living with limited access to basic services, were the most affected ones. The total value of damage and losses were reported to be NPR 706 billion (US\$7 billion) from the earthquakes and that from the flood was NPR 60.7 billion (US\$ 584.7 million).

Critical and productive community buildings, roads, bridges, culverts, trails and market facilities, irrigation canals, micro-hydro and drinking water supply schemes were severely damaged. The CILRP aims to support rapid restoration and rehabilitation of these infrastructures and improvement of livelihood, which are crucial to access the basic services and increase local economy.

APPROACH AND STRATEGY

- Strong partnership and collaboration with the local governments for sustainability and additional resources mobilization;
- Community-led decision making and implementation through capacity enhancement on recovery and resilience;
- Integrated approach on small-scale community infrastructure and livelihood recovery;
- Cash for work modality on construction for short term employment opportunity and immediate income to the poor household;
- Cost-effectiveness through the use of local resources and materials;
- Encouragement of gender equality, women empowerment and social inclusion, with focus on persons with disability at all levels, to promote social cohesion.
