SITUATION UPDATE

Unsustainable production of charcoal to meet the national and regional demands remains a major threat to environmental sustainability as well as security in Somalia. The programme envisages to address both the demand and supply side of the charcoal value chain by promoting regional cooperation to check illegal exports of charcoal, taking to scale alternative sources of energy across main cities and towns in Somalia and helping the vulnerable groups (women and youth) directly linked to charcoal value chain to adopt alternative sources of livelihoods.

During the reporting period, a PROSCAL Inception workshop was held on May 24 2017 in Mogadishu with key stakeholders from the Federal and Regional Member States (Puntland, Jubaland, Galmudug, South West and Hirshabelle). i.e. Ministry of environment, agriculture, interior, water, minerals, planning and regional cooperation, livestock, forestry and range, Health and safety, fisheries, and gender and women affairs.

. Focal point partners were selected and a field mission to Kismayo was proposed and agreed upon. Before the inception workshop, joint preparatory meetings were held by UNDP and FAO. The Kismayo field mission is planned to take place during 2017 Q3.

NARRATIVE

Debriefing meeting and consultations were held at federal and regional levels to update the new federal government officials on the design and implementation strategy for the Joint Programme. In this regard the new Minister of Livestock, Forest and Range was briefed by the Programme Advisor on the progress and quarterly planned activities. In addition, an inception workshop was held in Mogadishu on the 24 May 2017 for the relevant sector line ministries from the Federal Government and Regional Members States (Puntland, Galmudug, Hirshabelle, South West and Jubaland). The objectives of the Workshop were to:

- a) enlighten the stakeholders on the revised Programme document and implementation strategies
- b) detail out the establishment of focal point ministries at federal and regional level
- c) Contribute to three thematic areas i.e. Energy, Livestock and Agriculture
- d) recommend further revision of 2017 AWP based on receipt of new funds

The inception workshop observed positive signs with Federal Government and Regional Member States coming together to discuss implementation strategies and coordination mechanisms. Also, UNDP and FAO presented the progress of the Charcoal Programme and revised Programme document for implementation strategies and agree on the way forward. In Addition, a total of 43 (3 women) participants attended event and were divided into three main thematic working groups (Energy, Livestock and Agriculture). All groups discussed in detail on their chosen topic and came up with below recommended actions:

- the Regions of high charcoal production such as Jubaland and South Central States should be given priority in reducing charcoal trade and supporting alternative livelihoods.
- Other tertiary Regions Jowhar and lower Shebelle to be given second priority for the project.
- Project Implementation to start mid-July-December 2017 to realign better with the charcoal production season
- The Director Generals of environment ministries of regional states will act as a focal point and take the coordination role of the project.
- Elders and religious leaders will also work with their communities to find durable solutions to charcoal trade reduction
- Empowering women who are on the charcoal business to set up alternative energy businesses in liquefied petroleum and solar energy to minimise charcoal use, and build up opportunities to more alternative livelihoods

Other Key Achievements

- Initiation of national and regional policy on charcoal production, use and trade under the guidance of UNEP Regional Office for Africa. This was initiated in April 2017.
- A reconnaissance field mission was held in June by FAO to select beneficiary villages, agree on modalities of implementation and implementing partners.
- During the reporting period, 50 percent of the study area under Remote Sensing monitoring activity
 to establish the trends in the number of charcoal production sites between 2011 to 2017 in
 Badhaade-Afmadow-Bu'ale areas had been covered.
- Activity implementation work plan by FAO was drafted.



• Draft letters of agreement were prepared and circulated for review by FAO Management.

Challenges (incl: Delays or Deviations) and Lessons Learnt:

During the reporting period, implementation of planned activities remained slow due to security limitations, focus of key counterparts on drought response and dedications to the holy month of Ramadan.

Key lessons learnt were as follows:

- The inception workshop organized by UNDP and FAO for the sector line ministries at national and subnational level is considered as a good practice. Inception Workshop helped in understanding better the UN Joint Programme on Charcoal and the implementation of activities under 2017 AWP
- Strong political commitment, through community sensitization on environmental protection and reinforced regulatory frameworks are necessary to meaningfully address and reduce the massive charcoal trade and domestic use
