### South Sudan inflation rises to 682 percent

#### Radio Tamazuj- 8 Oct. 2016

South Sudan's inflation rate has risen 682 percent in the past year, South Sudan's Bureau of Statistics said today, further evidence that the country's economic outlook is worsening. The inflation was mainly driven by the high price of food and non-alcoholic beverages, which increased by 752 percent in the past year. The consumer price index, an indicator that measures the cost of items typical of South Sudanese, rose nearly 410 percent in Juba in the past year. Since December when the country decided to float its currency, hyperinflation has kicked in. The dollar was worth roughly 75 SSP on the black market in the month of September.

# S. Sudan Lakes state closes down accounts with Kenya bank Sudan Tribune- 8 Oct. 2016

Authorities in South Sudan's Lakes state have instructed ministers operating government bank account with the Kenya Commercial Bank (KCB) to immediately close them down. The state minister of finance, trade and industry, Daniel Gumwel Nhomabur, has confirmed receiving the new abrupt instruction from the national government in Juba. No explanation was given to the state government about the decision by the national minister of finance and economic planning to close down the governments accounts with the KCB. Minister Nhomabur further explained that the directive further said all government accounts are to be opened in the Ivory Bank with effect from October. "We are told by national ministry of finance in Juba to close down all our government accounts [in] KCB [Kenya Commercial Bank]. These instructions are from top authorities in Juba and we have to respect them. All government institutions must open new bank accounts with Ivory Bank with effect [from] this month," said the state finance

minister, Nhomabur However, KCB Rumbek's branch manager, John Makoi Marial, said although the bank has received the notification to close down the government accounts, there was still a discussion going on to resolve the matter. He also revealed that the government has taken huge loans of money from the KCB and also some individual senior government officials

took loans from the bank which they have not yet repaid. The bank official further pointed out that the KCB management and the government will sort out the issues and instruction will be sent to entire KCB branches in South Sudan on how to operate if the government decided to close down their accounts in the bank.

## Chinese company promises S Sudan medical devices

## Eye Radio South Sudan- 8 Oct. 2016

A china-based medical company has pledged to offer South Sudan more medical and humanitarian support, China.org.cn has reported. The support is aimed at boosting a viable health care system the ministry of health is struggling to develop. According to Jack Zhang, a senior official with Mindray's International, the supplies will include medical

devices, equipment, and high-technology machines. Health authorities are yet to comment on the development. This is going to be the second time the Chinese company has donated the young nation medical supplies. In 2013, the company donated unit color Doppler ultrasound Z6 and conducted training for doctors at the Juba Teaching Hospital.

# Nespresso Announces Progress, New Investments in Support of Coffee Farmers in Africa Sustainable Brand-10 Oct. 2016

Nespresso has announced a second wave of its Limited Edition Grand Cru SULUJA ti South Sudan coffee, representing continued progress in rebuilding South Sudan's coffee industry, and a \$6 million joint investment with the World Bank's International Finance Corporation (IFC) in a landmark collaboration to support coffee farmers in East Africa.
