



The framework for UNDP's support to Oé-Cusse SAR and ZEESM is built around two components: 'governance' and 'sustainable and innovative development'. The programme focuses on policy innovation to improve service delivery in key areas of development for the region: tourism, business development, agriculture and health.

LAUNCHING OÉ-CUSSE BUSINESS INCUBATOR



Launching of the Oé-Cusse Business Incubator

Last 16th of June the Oé-Cusse Business Incubator was launched by the President of ZEESM TL & RAEOA, Dr. Mari Alkatiri, on behalf of the Regional Secretariat of Tourism and Commerce, Inácia da Conceição Teixeira.

Aiming to foster sustainable livelihoods in the region, ZEESM TL has launched the Oé-Cusse Business Incubator (OBI) with the purpose of helping develop micro, small and medium businesses and build regional business capacity. Under the heading of "Stop thinking, start building", this initiative is a ZEESM sponsored programme that seeks to speed up the growth and success of startup and early stage companies, while supporting entrepreneurs in gaining access to funds —either internal funds or through external sources.

DEMOGRAPHIC GAP

During the launching, Dr. Alkatiri took the opportunity to address the demographic gap which means that more women than men in Oé-Cusse are between 15-49, the most economically active age group.

Currently, the OBI is located at the Secretariat of Tourism, Industry and Commerce, to foster networking among entrepreneurs and their OBI specialists. Undoubtedly, this is the ideal place where entrepreneurs can receive pro-active, value-added support,

and access to critical tools, information, education, contacts, resources and capital that may otherwise be unaffordable, inaccessible or unknown.


WHY OBI WILL MAKE THE DIFFERENCE?

Business Incubator Statistics demonstrates that this tool can Increase chances for success of local business. According to NBIA Survey, 87% of graduate entrepreneurs from Business Incubators are still in business after 5 years. In addition, this study shows that 84% of graduates stay in the community they were incubated and is a good investment for the government and the company since in the long term will generate more tax revenue than it cost. For that reason, ZEESM TL committed to developing an inclusive business that will lead an inclusive growth at the same time it can deliver sustainable solutions that alleviate poverty at scale.

COMMUNITY BASED TOURISM FIRST SET OF MEETINGS

Communities in Oé-Cusse take a leadership role to develop sustainable tourism



All the members of the community in Oesilo area actively participated in the workshops were many new ideas emerged to promote tourism in the region.

One of the fundamental elements of sustainable tourism development is that the government and tourism industry take into consideration the views and aspirations of the host community. By being directly involved in development of tourism, community is more likely to become an active partner and take a particular role in the ownership and sustainability of initiative. In Timor Leste government has set tourism development as one of its prime sectors for diversifying the economy and community based tourism as a tool for inclusive development.

With this direction UNDP is providing technical support to Regional Secretary for Community Tourism RAEOA – ZEESM TL in Oé-Cusse, Timor Leste, and working together with locals from remote areas of Fonte Sagrada, Bobocase and Oesilo to develop community based tourism.


MORE THAN 100 PEOPLE

After successful implementation of planned activities, in which more than 100 people have actively participated, working groups will be the carriers of two newly developed tourism products, while with support of OBI, at least 4 new tourism businesses and services will be developed. In 2018, Oé-Cusse will be able to offer travel packages potential visitors in Fonte Sagrada and Oesilo.

SUCCESS STORY HEALTH CARE DATA

Bringing positive changes to health care in Oé-Cusse through improved data collection

The Secretary of Health in ZEESM TL with UNDP and Ministry of Health support has implemented a training session for Timorese health management information system officers in order to improve existing data management and reporting system that guarantees evidence based decision making

The Secretary of Health in ZEESM TL, Lusia Taeki, in collaboration with UNDP Public Health Manager, Joel Okello, has been responsible for leading this team with two main goals: identify barriers to adequate data collection of the current data management system and propose steps toward the strengthening of the district health information system.

With a large experience in the field of Public Health, Okello's intervention is part of an attempt to improve the web based district health information system for ZEESM TL. Currently, Okello is a UNDP International Volunteer supporting the ZEESM's Secretary of Health in Oé-Cusse. As a Public Health, Monitoring and Evaluation expert, Okello is specialized in strengthening health management information systems -especially district based systems-, an area he implemented five years ago in 34 districts in Uganda. In Oé-Cusse, his work is focused on carrying out an assessment of the current data management systems and jointly developing a strategy to improve data collection with district and heath facility based staff.



In total, eight health management information systems officers attended the training sessions.


TRAINING SESSIONS

In total, eight health management information system officers from the district hospital and community health centers attended the training session facilitated by Dr. Murali Krishna that took place on 4th and 5th of July 2017 in Oé-Cusse.

During the training, Okello highlighted the importance of health care data being available to improve decision making process of the Timorese government and health officials. "The health data system faltered in the past, with poor quality data that is unsuitable for decision making", claimed Okello, and added: "Without quality data defined by timeliness, completeness and accuracy, evidence based decisions cannot be made. Data is like a bell that sounds a warning and corrective action has to be taken as a result". Overall, this personnel training is a part of an ambitious project aimed at ensuring that health care decisions and investments are based on timely, complete and accurate information.

After reviewing the current data management and reporting system, ZEESM TL with the support of UNDP Public Health Manager based in Oé-Cusse, came to the conclusion that staff capacity enhancement, Internet access, availability of data collection tools and reporting forms at health facility were the key constraints where they should concentrate all effort. For this reason, the system is now based on dedicated staff, called Health Management Information system (HMI), whose job is to gather and verify the data before updating the database.

Monthly reporting forms have also been distributed to all 22 health facilities in Oé-Cusse. Mentoring of health staff on data management will continue to ensure that gains observed in the last two months are sustained.



HMIS reporting was haphazard before the refresher training conducted at the beginning of July 2017. However, with the training and mentoring of health information system officers conducted prior to the training, improvement in reporting rates based on complete Outpatient and Inpatient reports has improved

Created with citizens in mind the concept, design and content were created to ensure ease of access. The website, www.ZEESM.tl is multilingual, with versions in Tetum, Portuguese and English and was created in conjunction with UNDP. Pages are clearly laid out, easy to navigate. Search boxes are on every page, along with clouds of key words that lead to summaries of information on those items, a tradition dropdown menu was also included.

PROCUREMENT TRAINING SESSION



The Zeesm Procurement unit is an example of effective capacity development. Poor knowledge and understanding of processes and standards can often lead to a perception of lack of transparency and efficiency in public sector delivery. Since 2015, the procurement unit has implemented several actions: a procurement strategic plan; SOPs development in line with national regulation; training to all staff in the SOPs and procedures to ensure transparency and effectiveness in procurement; develop a procurement unit with skilled staff; and procured items and launched large international tenders.



DURING JUNE 2017

A Procurement training on the new Procurement Manual/SOPs for the SAR/ZEESM Procurement staff was delivered by International Procurement Advisor in June. Scenario cases were also presented during the training to provide handson training to local procurement staff, demonstrate the best practice and refresh their professional knowledge.
